HAMBURG BELLE IS WINNER

Daly's Filley Takes the Futurity at the Sheepshead Bay Track.

ONE SERIOUS ACCIDENT MARS THE DAY Barrier Fails to Rise, Some Horses

Are Left and Angered Crowd Surges to Judges' Stand Protesting.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.-Hamburg Belle worthy daughter of the famous Hamburg, won the Futurity today in footing not to her liking, but in a race marred only by her awerve near the finish. For this the splendid filly made amends by the tremendous burst of speed she showed when straightened out again, carrying her to the wire in front.

Her performance, the full six furlongs ! 1:13, is the record for the race at that distance. From 1892 to 1901, inclusive, the Futurity course was seventy feet short of six furlongs. Savable made the record of 1:14 last year.

Throughout she was the speedlest and at the end the gamiest, coming in on the heaviest part of the track near the rail. Fuller rode with perfect judgment. When Leonidas challenged, a sixteenth from the finish, Fuller struck Hamburg Belle with his whip and she swerved sideways six feet, reducing her length's lead to nothing. The boy then dropped his whip, and, sitting down to ride, called on the beautiful filly Totals .. 2 9x25 10 1 to do her best. Nobly she responded, and, spurting away, shook off her half brother, winning the greatest 2-year-old prize of

the world by a head. No shame rests on little Leonidas because of his defeat. Giving his sister six pounds more than her sex allowance, he raced from post to finish like the splendid thoroughbred he is. The Minute Man, John E. Madden's entry, was third-four lengths behind Leonidas. His placing himself amongst the first three was lucky. William C. Whitney saw a daughter and a son of his great race horse, Hamburg, run first and second, and that contented him

with the loss of the first place. Then Came Small Riot. The day's racing concluded with the most

sensational episode of the eastern turf season. The barrier falled to rise and the four starters dashed through it. Collegian caught in the cords, was thrown and Black Hussar was left at the post. Flying Ship, the 9 to 20 favorite, won, far ahead of Swamplands.

Surging about the judge's stand an immense throng shouted "no race" and hissed and jeered when the numbers were run up. The chief of the Jockey club's police force went among the excited men. - "Stop shouting 'No race,' " he said loudly to those pear him. At this the crowd shouted "Crook crook," and one man hissed in the face of the chief, who ordered a policeman to arrest him "for inciting a riot." Strategy may have prompted the move, for when the blue coat marched the offender away 500 rebellious men followed them, making a great uproar. The policeman took the hisser to the gate and freed him.

Meantime the angriest of the disappointed betters had been drawn away from the judge's stand and the "red block" went up and everybody went home.

Rain for two days preceded Futurity day and the early light drizzle turned to fine stinging rain just before the great race. The stiff wind blew down the Futurity course and helped Grenade, winner of the second race, to make the remarkable time of 1:05% over the heavy track for five and a half furlongs. This time was doubted when first hung up, but on its confirmation trainers who had wavered at sight of the and decided that the track was safe

How Futurity Was Won. Dovecote was withdrawn sarly and the halk soon went through the name of Beldame, leaving the Belmont stable no rep resentative in the Futurity. Hamburg Belle straightened out like a

greyhound and shot through the mud toward the near goal. In a second she was going faster than Leonidas and in a moment more was home first, winner and greatest turf heroine of 1966.
