Government Weather Bulletin Report Causes Advance in Wheat.

CORN GOES UP ON SAME STATEMENT

Oats Follow Upward Tendency of Other Grains, While Provision Market Developed Strength of Its Own.

cHICAGO, Sept. 1.—Wheat was easy early, but closed firm at an advance of 346 35c for December. Corn was strong, De-cember closing 3605c higher; December oats were up 15c, with provisions 16123c higher.

Continued good weather in the northwest, together with earler cables, gave an easy start to the wheat market. December opening 1/46/4c lower at 81/4c. There was a little better feeling later on with a fair demand from shorts, but free offerings by pit traders kept prices down until the government weather bureau report was 18-80-80, when the early loss was recovered and the market became firm. There was little interest in the trading, which was the lightest experienced for several weeks. The close was at the top, 81%c for December, a net gain of 1/86/4c. Clearances of wheat and flour were equal to 184,000 bu. Bradstreet's world's available showed an increase of 900,000 bu., against 365,000 bu. last week, and 2,908,000 bu. a year ago. Primary receipts were \$11,000 bu. Minneapoils and Duluth reported receipts of 315 cars, which, with local receipts of 136 cars, 11 of contract grade, made a total for the three points of 481 cars, against 342 cars last week and 355 a year ago.

The feature in the corn pit was the covering in the September option by shorts on predictions of cold weather west and the builtsh government bulletin, which declared dry warm weather urgently needed. NEW YORK, Sept. GUSHER IN EVANSTON FIELDS Productive Well is Struck in Wyoming Where Omaha People Are Interested.

D. C. Patterson has received word that a gusher has been struck in the oil fields near Evanston, Wyo., in which a number of Omaha citizens are interested. The well which is located on section twenty-three in the Union Pacific grant, began spouting when the drill had gone 1,100 feet into the oil sand, and the oil after being forced above the derrick formed a pool a half mile away. Much gas accompanied the flow which continued for several hours. After this had ceased pumping was begun and the oil surface reduced to 100 feet below the surface where it remained.
