

NOT CONGRESSMAN AT TIME Attorney for Edmund H. Driggs Files a Brief Outlining the

Defense. NEW YORK, Sept. 2.-Counsel for Ex-Congressman Edmund H. Driggs who is under indictment in connection with the postoffice frauds, has filed in the United States circuit court, Brooklyn, a brief as to the constitutionality under which the indictments were found.

The point is made that the statute of limitation shall be liberally construed in favor of his client.
