Dickinson Delegates Keep Out of Convention and Emmet Names a Man.

QUEER TURN IN BUTLER BREMER DISTRICT

Receiver is Asked for Northwestern Life and Savings Company and Transfer of Business Objected To.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, Sept. 2.—(Special.)—B. F. Robinson of Emmet county appeared before the secretary of state early this morning and filed his nomination papers as the republican nominee for representative in the Emmet-Dickinson district. The papers were in regular form and the name will go on the ballot. Mr. Robinson's haste was due to the fact that there was a serious disagreement in the convention, or in the district. The two counties comprising the Emmet-Dickinson district, the Dickinson county delegates were absent and the delegation refused to present credentials to the committee or to take part beyond the temporary organization. The Emmet county men proceeded to nominate Robinson. The Dickinson county delegates who were present afterwards met and nominated Dr. G. A. Fuller of their county for the same office.
