Heretofore it has been the custom for nonresident pupils in Douglas county to pay but \$18.50, the remainder, \$28.50, being paid by the county under a law which has been declared unconstitutional. For this reason all nonresident pupils at the High school will be required to hand over the full amount in advance this fall. Superintendent Pearse has issued this bul-

Compulsory Attendance Law.

The following features of the compulsory attendance law are of general interest. In some of these items the law has been changed since last year:

First-Children who are 7 years old, but not yet 15 years old, must attend either the public schools or a private or parochial school, or receive regular instruction from some person qualified to instruct in the studies taught in the public schools.

Second—This attendance must begin on the day the public schools open and must continue for two-thirds of the time school is in assaion during the year. In Omaha this will require an attendance of twenty-five and one-third weeks.

Third—The attendance must be continuous until the required period is completed. Children cannot start in with the opening of school and then drop out in a short time. They must not only begin on time, but must attend regularly for the twenty-five and one-third weeks.

Fourth—Children from 7 to 18 years old

one-third weeks.

Fourth-Children from 7 to 18 years o'd, who are deaf or blind, must attend the School for the Deaf at Omaha, or the School for the Bilind at Nebraska City, unless such children are being privately instructed in a suitable manner.

PRINTERS' UNION PROSPERS Organization Never Was in Better Condition, Says President James M. Lynch.
