

HOME TEAM BREAKS EVEN

Des Moines Takes the First One by Batting Rally in Tenth.

SENSATIONAL FINISH IN THE SECOND

Pitcher Miller Wins His Own Game in the Ninth by a Three-Bagger, Scoring Two Men.

Des Moines and Omaha broke even on a double-headed yesterday.

Both were marked by heavy hitting and some of the sharpest and also some of the raggedest fielding that has been seen on the Omaha grounds this season. In the first game a miff of a hot liner, followed by a wild throw to first by Thomas, ultimately netted Des Moines two runs, which proved the undoing of Omaha's hopes. These two runs left the score a tie in the ninth and in the tenth the visitors proceeded to show what they could do, and it was plenty—three runs and the game. After this unfortunate bungle Jack Thornton raised the hopes of the fans in the next inning by lifting the ball over the fence for a home run, driving in one ahead of him. This only tied the score and there was nothing more doing for Omaha, but the visitors were more than busy in their part of the tenth.

The second game was even more exciting than the first. There were more examples of poor ball playing and also more of the gut-edged kind. One of these was a pickup by Creighton of what looked like a two-bagger and another was a running catch by Clarke of Des Moines. O'Leary for the visitors also brought down the grand stand by a couple of fine stops. On the other hand Duntz Miller muffed two flies. It is generally conceded that when a high ball goes into Duntz's garden the trouble is ended, but this was not of that nature, but fair to say, however, that he is in no condition, physically, to play. Shugart also contributed two miscues to the advantage of the visitors.

Umpire McCarthy was also a feature of the game. Possibly he pleased himself but it is a cliché that no one else among other players or spectators was pleased with his work.

Omaha's half of the ninth in the second game was where the fireworks came in. Des Moines was two to the good, which was the first man up and he lined out a clean single. The bleachers saw some hope. Shugart followed with a little one which forced Welch at second, but Shugart was safe at first. Bobby Carter was called from the bench to bat for Gordon and he brought his good eye along with him and walked in consequence. Creighton came up and cracked out a single on which Miller to do something and he did it. Two more runs were necessary to win the game and a two-bagger was the result. Miller and he delivered the goods—the third hit he had made in the game. There was something doing just at this time. Neither the bleachers nor the grandstand collapsed, but the air was certainly full of noise, and then the crowd broke.
