"I feel that the national irrigation movement has now passed through the preliminary period, and that the time has come for the people of Omaha to do everything to bring its benefits into your own trade ter-

apostle of irrigation who had come to this city from Chicago to address the executive committee of the Commercial club on the work which is being done by the National Irrigation association. ticular. He said Tuesday morning: "I found Nebraskans everywhere, some prosperous and others yearning for a return to the green fields of their state. While Portland, Seattle and Tacoma possess every indication of thrift and enterprise, with their wharves laden with imports and exports, there is something lackan instance Seattle. Almost every month there comes from Cape Nome or the Klondike vessels bringing from \$250,000 to \$1,250,000 in gold dust. It is a city of nearly the population of Omaha, but its bank clearings show up very poorly as com-pared with Omaha. Take, for instance, the bank clearance statements for the week of August 29 as a comparison. Omaha's clearances were \$6,369,923; those of Seattle

\$3,585,321; Portland, \$2,894,989, and Tacoma, "One would naturally think that the clearances of the coast cities, with their commercial advantages and their proximity to the gold mines of Alaska, and with their immense canning and lumbering industries
