American Admiral Calls Upon the New Governor at Beyrut.

UNITED STATES CONSULATE PROTECTED

Government's Representative Takes Personal Charge of Place.

BULGARIAN SITUATION NOW SERIOUS

Approach of Turkish Troops to Border May Bring Crisis.

POWERS PLAN FOR A NEUTRAL PACT

Russia and Austria Are Not to Give Support to Either Side, but Hold Both Accountable for Their Actions.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—The Navy department today posted the following bulletin: Admiral Cotton telegraphed from Beyrut, 12th inst., that he had exchanged very satisfactory talks with the governor general.

Twenty-eight persons, including the principals in the disturbances of last Sunday, have been arrested. Administration of new governor general inspires confidence.

Cheikh Bey, the Turkish minister, called at the State department today. A cablegram received today by Cheikh Bey from his government told of a fierce encounter which took place yesterday near Kesey between Turkish troops and Bulgarian brigades.

The dispatch adds that Turkish soldiers at Kirk-Kiliseh, in Turkish territory, fired on the French consulate, breaking the windows. A party of Turkish soldiers near Gibebe had with them twenty Bulgarian women and girls. Five hundred fugitive women and children have arrived at Tekendche.

PARIS, Sept. 14.—The Foreign office advice from Bulgaria show that the situation is growing more serious, owing to reports that the Turkish troops are slowly nearing the border.

It is added that the Princess Clementine, mother of Prince Ferdinand, saw King Edward at Vienna, and that her son was in a deplorable position and in danger of his life and begged the king to have a vessel in readiness to carry him away from Bulgaria.

King Edward, it is further asserted, assured Princess Clementine that Prince Ferdinand would find an asylum in England.

Will Adopt Guerrilla Methods. SOFIA, Bulgaria, Sept. 14.—Warned by previous disastrous experiences, the revolutionary leaders have decided to adopt only guerrilla tactics in eastern Macedonia.

The policy of occupying towns and villages has proved a mistake, as it has usually resulted in Turkey recouping the villages, destroying everything and killing the inhabitants.

Insurgents now have nearly 2,000 men armed with rifles in eastern Macedonia, and thousands of peasants are ready to join their forces when a general rising has been proclaimed.

Whips Turkish Ambassador. VIENNA, Sept. 14.—Dieded Abdullah Bey, the physician to the Turkish embassy here today attacked and thrashed the Turkish ambassador, Nedim Bey, whom he accused of sending unfavorable reports concerning him to the ports, thereby preventing him from securing a better position.

Palma Starts on Tour. HAVANA, Sept. 14.—President Palma received an enthusiastic send-off from Havana on his departure on his tour of eastern Cuba.
