Corn Reaches Lowest Point Since the Frost Scare, but Decline Checked by Buying Through Fear of a Storm.

CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—Final grain prices showed improvement. December wheat was ac, corn ac and oats ac nighe. Over yesterday's close. Provisions were irregular, from so lower to 22c nigher.

There was good buying in wheat early, after a moderatery strong opening, based on fairly firm cacles and good export trace prospecies, with December up led to ac to act of the firm weather and an easy tone in the northwest markets, due to the prospective millers' strike, and prices went down before liberal offerings from northwest, and southwest, December touching asse before the decline and checked.
