

SAVINE IN A TIGHT PLACE

Escapes Twice from Siberia and is Likely to Have Another Chance.

HAS A REMARKABLE CRIMINAL CAREER

PROSECUTING OF SOCIALISTS

Every Disrespectful Allusion to Emperor to Be Taken Into Court.

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BERLIN, Sept. 26.—(New York World Cablegram—Special Telegram.)—A ministerial circular from the Prussian minister of justice asks the general attorneys to prosecute the socialist newspapers for high treason and to arrest the editors every time they are responsible for disrespectful allusions, even addressed to the emperor's acts. It is supposed that this circular is the result of recent lenient proceedings in the courts against socialist editors.

PRINCESS RUPERT RECOVERS

Operation Conducted by New York Physician is Entirely Successful.

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MUNICH, Bavaria, Sept. 26.—(New York World Cablegram—Special Telegram.)—Princess Rupert, who was recently operated on by a New York physician, Dr. Kiliani, for appendicitis, has so far recovered as to be able to drive out and called on the duchess of Modena. Dr. Kiliani has already started for Bremen on his way back to New York.

High Rate of Speed.

BERLIN, Sept. 26.—A high speed trial over the Kosen experiment electric railroad today resulted in training a speed of the rate of over 117 miles per hour.

Riots Occur in Berlin.

BERLIN, Sept. 26.—Several riots occurred here, owing to the striking omnibus men surrounding the vehicles driven by non-strikers, beating the drivers and cutting the harness of the horses. Police mounted and on foot, charged the mob which were breaking windows on the Moritz Platz.

ARREST PRESIDENT OF UNION

Colorado Militia Takes Man Into Custody, Alleging that He is Intimidated Driver.

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CRIPPLE CREEK, Colo., Sept. 26.—William Doodsworth, president of union No. 10, was arrested this morning at his home in Goldfield by the military and thrown in the "bull pen." He asked the soldiers with what crime he was charged, but they refused to assign any reason for taking him into custody. Doodsworth was but recently elected president of the Union union. He is a large property owner in the town of Goldfield.

MRS. DAVIS IS VERY ILL

Doctors, However, Say that There is Still a Chance for Her to Recover.

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BUFFALO, Sept. 26.—Mrs. Jefferson Davis is worse this morning, her condition being considered critical. The doctors say, however, that the crisis has not been reached and should she get relief she may recover. Several relatives and friends have arrived and are at her bedside.

Private Banker Disappears.

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PITTSBURGH, Sept. 26.—The alleged disappearance of a private banker, J. P. Schaefer, who was reported to have been in the city, has been confirmed by the foreigner. Four informants, charging embezzlement, have been arrested and are being held in custody. It is believed that the total deposits were about \$100,000.

DYNAMITE USED TO MURDER

Robbers Near Washington Blow Paymaster Up with Explosives.

HE MEETS WITH INSTANT DEATH

Satchel Containing Money is Raised off Its Contents and Robbers and Murderers Succeed in Making Their Escape.

WASHINGTON, Pa., Sept. 26.—A murder and robbery occurred this afternoon on the Middletown road, about fifteen miles from here. Samuel L. Ferguson, of the Ferguson Construction company of Pittsburgh, was instantly killed and his secretary, Charles L. Martin of Cincinnati, was fatally injured.

The two men were driving along the road in a buggy, carrying \$5,000 in cash with which to pay off some of their men employed on construction work along the line of the Wabash railroad when suddenly an explosion of dynamite in the roadway literally tore the rig in pieces, killed Ferguson outright and threw Martin 300 feet, tearing his left eye almost from the socket.

It has been learned that two men, supposed to be Poles, placed the dynamite in the roadway for the purpose of killing Paymaster Ferguson and had arranged to explode it by means of an electric battery. The satchel containing the money is missing. Two suspects are under arrest.

No New Developments.

WASHINGTON, Pa., Sept. 26.—Up to 11 o'clock today there were no further developments in the crime resulting in the murder and robbery of Samuel L. Ferguson on the West Middletown road yesterday afternoon.

The two men who were apprehended as suspects were identified as Frank Francis and Joseph Huston, former employes at the Ferguson camp. They declared any knowledge of the crime and say that on Thursday night they slept at McClay's school house, about four miles northwest of West Middletown. They say they can prove that they had nothing to do with the robbery of the two men, which was entered by the men who fixed the fuse that blew Ferguson to death.

The abandoned mine on the Patterson farm, near the scene of the tragedy, which was supposed to have been used as a refuge by the criminals, was searched this morning without any evidence being discovered that the men had been hiding there and the searchers left satisfied that the mine was empty.

Ferguson's Satchel is Found.

Early today John Welsh, a resident of West Middletown, found the satchel in which Ferguson carried the money. It was found in a field about 2.50 miles from the scene of the tragedy and was estimated to be worth \$5,000. It was filled with bills amounting to about \$2,500. Some \$20 in silver was left in it.

A coat, vest and collar were found, but it is not yet known where they belonged. It had evidently been rifled shortly after the tragedy by the man who was seen by Louis Liggett, the farmer working near the scene, who guarded his treasure with a drawn revolver and was allowed to go unharmed for that reason.

MURDER PUZZLES OFFICERS

Max of Many Occupations, Stricken Down by an Assassin.

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NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—Frederick Adrian Verdu, who died early today from wounds inflicted by an unknown person while he was watching a house in Fifty-eighth street, is said to have been at the time a paymaster in the navy and was until recently in the employ of a submarine boat company as consulting engineer.

BURGLARS SECURE A TRIFLE

Damage to Ewing Bank Fixtures and Safe More Than Money Stolen.

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EWING, Neb., Sept. 26.—(Special Telegram.)—The robbery of the Ewing State bank Thursday night did not prove profitable to the robbers, but resulted in the total demolition of the safe and considerable damage to the banking room and furniture. The amount secured by the burglars was \$125, being the change kept in the safe outside the money chest. The explosion loosened the chest door, but not sufficiently to reach the cash. The effect, however, of the general explosion was to reduce the value of the currency to shreds. The loss was fully covered by burglar insurance in the United States Fidelity Guaranty company of Baltimore and the loss was adjusted today.

SPEYER PEOPLE SHUT OUT

Representatives of New York Bankers Will Not Be Allowed to Examine Consolidated Books.
