Judge McPherson yesterday set aside the verdict of the jury and imposed a sentence of six years in the case of Lina Linnier, the colored soldier, convicted at the in the Chicago proceedings are known here. 1903. Linnier was convicted by the federal jury of murder without the death penalty. His attorney filed a motion for a new trial, and the motion was granted a few weeks ago. look for a strike.

Immediately after the motion for a new trial was granted, Linnier agreed to plead guilty to the crime of manslaughter and submit to sentence being imposed at once. United States District Attorney Summers objected and Judge McPherson took the case under advisement. This decision sets aside the verdict of the jury and he at once permitted the defendant to enter a plea of guilty to manalaughter. Linnier stated that he was willing to enter the plea of manalaughter and did so. Judge McPherson thereupon sentenced him to six years in the penitentiary at Sloux Falls, 8. D.

Judge McPherson's opinion was in writing and covered several type-written pages. The decision holds that the court has the right to set aside a vordict and accept a plea of guilty for a lessor crime. The decision establishes a precedent, new in certain features, and will be published in the Federal Reporter. Numerous authorities were alted in support of the decision.

The defendant Linnier, manifested every expression of gratitude over the decision and willingly accepted the modified sentenes. He will be taken to Sloug Falls at once to enter upon his sentence.
