PHILIPPINES THE PRINCIPAL PLANK Instructions by Courts Are Condemned and Election of Senators by Direct Vote of the People is Favored.

THREE DIE IN DEATH CHAIR Brothers Are Electrouted for the Murder of Their Uncle.

ONLY FIFTEEN MINUTES NECESSARY Crime for Which They Pay Penalty Actuated by Revenge for the Foreclosure of Mortgage on Stepmother's Home.

DANNEMORA, N. Y., Oct. 1.—Without one unforced incident to mar the perfect and dignified execution of the death penalty imposed by the trial court, sustained by the court of appeals and not interfered with by Governor Odell, Willis, Frederick M. and Burton Van Wormer were put to death in fifteen and one-half minutes at Clinton prison today for the murder of their uncle, Peter A. Hallenbeck, at Greendale on Christmas eve, 1902.

During the first execution Father Charbonneau remained in the corridor between the death cells, reading prayers and invitations to the remaining Wormers. Every precaution had been taken to prevent the remaining men from hearing more than the departure of their brother from the room.

Three applications of the current and four minutes time were required for the execution of Willis, but only two applications in the case of Frederick and two minutes from the time he crossed the threshold of the room the doctors pronounced him dead.

On Christmas eve, 1902, with their cousin, Harvey Bruce, the three brothers drove from their home in Kinderhook, some four miles, to the hamlet of Greendale, in Columbia county, where lived Peter A. Hallenbeck, the uncle of the Van Wormers.

Dr. Damon, Spitzka and McDonald had carefully examined the bodies of the three, but in the case of Burton, the last, other physicians who were present among the witnesses were asked to step forward and examine the body as it remained in the chair, and so the official pronouncement of death was naturally delayed.

On April 8 all three were found guilty and sentenced to be put to death in the week ending May 29, 1902. Their appeal to the court of appeals failed, a stay, and the case went over to the present year.

It is known that Governor Odell would have welcomed any plausible ground upon which to commute the sentence, as he felt that little would result from the public mind from the morbid interest attaching to the triple execution.

BUCHANAN HAS THE VOTES Head of Iron Workers Proves His Ability to Enforce His Desires.

IS NOW CANDIDATE FOR RE-ELECTION Claims that a Majority of the Delegates Have Promised Support—Parks Acts with Former Opponents.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 1.—Frank Buchanan's re-election as president of the International Association of Bridge Structural and Ornamental Iron Workers is assured, according to his friends tonight, who say positive claim to forty-eight out of the eighty-three votes in the annual convention now in session here.

President Buchanan expressed his confidence in his final victory over the Parks crowd. Previously Samuel Parks had declared that he would fight against paying this money. Today he voted with the rest of the delegates to support the president's claim.

The Parks people assert as positively as ever that their candidate, H. F. Donnelly of Albany, will be elected. The election will take place tomorrow, and in the light to name the head of the organization will lay the real struggle of the convention between the Parks and the anti-Parks elements.

When a general agreement is to be entered into by the convention, Parks made a speech in which he urged the delegates to elect a committee to investigate the action of the Parks crowd, principally, it was said, because he had supported President Buchanan in upholding the latter's action in suspending Parks and local No. 2.

FILES OF PAPER IN COURT Editors' Act Called North Carolina Tragedy Are Being Read.

JENKINS SWORD INCIDENT INVOLVED One Witness Testifies that He Saw Pistol in Tillman's Pocket on the Day Before the Shooting.

LEXINGTON, S. C., Oct. 1.—J. W. King, a member of the legislature from Florence county, was the first witness called by the state today when the trial of J. H. Tillman was resumed.
