# COUNCIL BLUFFS.

Twelve Companies of Regiment Enroute to Riley Meet at Bluffs.

EXPECT TO SPEND A DAY IN THE CITY

First Companies to Arrive to Be Held Until All Reach City, When They Will Depart for the South.

The people of Council Bluffs will have the opportunity of seeing the entire Fiftyregiment, Iowa National Guard, before it leaves to take part in the regular army maneuvers at Fort Riley, Kan. The entire regiment will mobolize in Council Bluffs on Saturday, October 17, and from here proceed in a special train to Fort Riley. The mobilization of the regiment here will recall to some extent the scenes attendant on the return to lowa of the old Fifty-first lowa volunteers from the Philippines, when crowds from all over the state gathered in Council Bluffs to welcome the soldlers home. The Fiftyfirst was mustered out of the service and the Fifty-fifth was raised in its place. In several of the companies are men who served fo the Philippines and partook of the hospitality extended by Council Bluffs on their return from the campaign.

The plan of the mobilization involves the bringing of the twelve companies to Council Bluffs on the afternoon of October 17. The companies will be kept here under military orders until all have arrived and the battallons completed. In the evening the entire regiment will leave by special trains over the Kansas City, St. Joseph & Council Bluffs road for Kansas City. From there the journey will be completed to Fort Riley

A special horse car will leave Des Moines for Council Bluffs October 16 and will pick up at Ames, Carroll, Boone and other points the mounts of the regimental officers. The men will travel on regular government rations and will be cared for by the quartermaster's department of the regular army. The only commissary provision which will be made at this point will be hot coffee, which will be served the men on arriving in the Bluffs.

The Fifty-fifth regiment, Iowa National Guard, is the only militia regiment to be brigaded with the regular troops. It wil be brigaded with the Sixth and Twenty-fifth regulars.

To complete the companies to the regula tion quota men will be drafted from the other three regiments of the militia. Company L. the Dodge Light Guard of this city, will be recruited to the full strength with men from Companies L of the Fiftythird, Fifty-fourth and Fifty-sixth regiments. The twelve companies composing the Fifty-fifth regiment are from Des Moines, Villisca, Glenwood, Knoxville, Shenandoah, Winterset, Chariton, Bedford, Corning, Red Oak and Council Bluffs.

#### Collateral Inheritance Tax.
