War would be a great calamity. Here we believe that the best way to prevent it would be to strengthen ourselves as much as possible. We have never left no steps untried for that purpose.

THE DETAILS OF THE MANEUVERS WERE KEPT SECRET.

The details of the maneuvers were kept secret, but the correspondent of the Associated Press learned that the landing forces at Tientsin were 25,000 men. It is reported that the attacking army broke through Fort Arthur's defenses at three points.

TWO BATTALIONS AND TWO CRUISERS ARE ON THEIR WAY FROM RUSSIA.

Two battalions and two cruisers are on their way from Russia. When they arrive at Tientsin, the Russian officials will be stronger than Japan's, according to the views of the Russian officials.
