

WORLD'S RECORD BROKEN

Six Heats in Row Are Trotted in Average Time of 2:08 1/2.

LEXINGTON SEES WONDERFUL SHOWING

In Record-Breaking Race Six Heats Fail to Determine Results and Darkness Stops the Contest.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 14.—The fastest six heats ever trotted in one race failed to produce a winner today in the McDowell stakes. The race is for 2:10 trotters, purse \$5,000. Two heats each have been won by Monte Carlo, Hawthorne, and Dr. Strong.

The deciding heat was postponed on account of darkness and will be trotted tomorrow. The previous world's record for six heats in a row was made in the Transylvania race in which the heats were trotted in an average of 2:08 1/2.

The six heats today were trotted in an average of 2:08 1/2. Today's race lowered the record by one-third of a second. The first two heats were won by Monte Carlo, Hawthorne winning the second two.

Five other records were broken in the McDowell stakes. Hawthorne reduced the track record from 2:05 1/2, held by Prince of Orange, to 2:04 1/2. She broke the stake record of 2:07, held by Charley Herr, reduced her own record from 2:08 1/2 to 2:05 1/2, and equaled the record for the fastest heat of the year, made by Ferno at Oakley, Monte Carlo reduced his own record from 2:07 1/2 to 2:07, and Dr. Strong reduced his record from 2:10 to 2:09 1/2.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—A bad accident occurred during the running of the sixth race at Brighton Beach today, resulting in the death of Jockey Frank Miller. The race was for maiden 2-year-olds at six furlongs, the winner to receive \$10,000.

The start was fairly but before the field had gone half a mile, Sonoma Bell, ridden by Frank Miller, attempted to go up the rail and in doing so was shut up against the fence and fell with Miller up and under his back, and tumbled over Sonoma Bell. Miller was thrown heavily and died a few minutes after he had been taken to the temporary hospital on the track.

An examination showed the print of a horse's hoof on his chest. Miller escaped injury. Dr. Madden, the minuteman broke his leg in the first race and was destroyed by a horse.
