GETS MAN AFTER HARD CHASE

Captain John Webb Runs Down Italian Accused of Counterfeiting.

PRISONER NOW IN SIOUX CITY JALI

Captain John Webb of the United States Secret service returned Wednesday night from Fort Dodge, Ia., where he succeeded after a lengthy chase in running down and capturing an alleged Italian counterfeiter named Frank Martorano, alias Con Viesko, Word was received here October 3, from Webster City, Ia., that a persistent and partially successful effert was being made to pass a quantity of spurious \$5 legal tender notes in that vicinity.
