ADVOCATES WHIPPING POST

Judge Day of District Court Suggests that for Recalcitrant Husbands and Fathers.

RECORD SHOWS DIVORCES INCREASING

Eighty-Five Per Cent of One Hundred and Twenty-Six in Omaha Are Applied For by Women.

Judge Day of the district court advocates the old-fashioned whipping post as a remedy for divorces and a means of punishing recalcitrant husbands and fathers who desert their wives and children.

The marital troubles of the citizens of Omaha seem to be on the increase. The record of Judge Day's court may be taken as a criterion. Today Judge Day has rounded out a year on the district bench, and during that period he has granted 136 divorces. In at least 85 per cent of these cases the applications for divorce have been made by the wives. A great per cent of the cases have been instituted on the ground of abandonment. It is thought that the number of cases where the husband has deserted wife and babies is larger in Omaha than in any other city in the United States according to population. An act of the last legislature makes abandonment a penitentiary offense. Speaking of this act Judge Day said:

"I think it a very wise provision. The only way to get at these men is to make it a criminal offense for them to abandon wife and home. What we need here is the old-fashioned whipping post. The administration of physical punishment of some kind is the only effective method of reaching a man who has so blunted his conscience that he will go so far as to desert his wife and babies without a moment's notice."

"Various other things have been alleged in these suits for divorce, but the fact that many of them are based on the ground of abandonment is especially noticeable. Other charges have included drunkenness, cruel and gross treatment, attempts at murder and things of that kind."

In the opinion of Judge Day the divorce problem is a very grave one and calls for the ablest thought of the day. While the number of divorces in Omaha is large, a correspondingly large increase in the number of divorces is noted in other cities. The question, he insists, is, therefore, of more than local interest, and would seem to demand the careful thought of good people in every section of the country.
