The program promises to be one of the very best ever presented in southwestern Iowa, and represents an expenditure of between \$500 and \$700.

The headquarters of the association will be at the Grand hotel, where teachers will report on their arrival in the city.

Officers Elected a Mob. OTTUMWA, Ia., Oct. 21.—(Special Telegram.)—On the charge of attempted criminal assault on the person of Johann Anderson, an old resident of Eldon, aged 75, Aberdeen Phillips, an Italian laborer, was bound over to the grand jury today. The prisoner narrowly escaped lynching while being taken from the court room. A heavily-armed mob formed in the street, awaiting the officers with their prisoner. They were stopped by Constable Samuel Crow, who sprang the accused through the rear door and into a buggy. The horses were whipped up and the prisoner driven to Ottumwa, where he is confined. Phillips is charged with brutally assaulting the aged woman, beating and choking her almost into insensibility. No further trouble is anticipated from the mob.
