NOT OPERATIVE TILL SPRING

New Revenue Law Held to Be Ineffectively Until Next April.

COURT SAYS IT APPLIES TO OMAHA

Taxpayers Not Compelled to Answer So-Called Incriminating Questions—Plaintiffs Satisfied with Decision.

Judges Baxter and Day yesterday announced their decision in the case of Warren Switzer against William Fleming as tax commissioner for the city of Omaha.

Upon the convening of court in Judge Day's room a large company of attorneys and interested citizens was present.

In his opening remarks Judge Baxter said that the bill brought by Mr. Switzer embodied some important points.

In deciding the question as to whether the new law is applicable to the city of Omaha, Judge Baxter said that after mature deliberation and full investigation both the judge and Judge Day were agreed on the proposition that it was applicable to the city of Omaha.

Regarding the contention that the tax commissioner was attempting to include within his schedule a list of questions which are alleged to be incriminating, the court held that answers to these questions could not be enforced at this time for the reason that the new law does not become operative, according to its own provisions, until April 1, 1904.

Decision is Overlooked. A very important phase of the controversy was then reached when the court passed on the portion of Mr. Fleming's schedule which provides for the imposition of an extra 50 per cent on an assessment which has not been voluntarily and truly returned.

"It is evident that our legislature," said Judge Baxter, "in placing this in the new law, overlooked a decision of the supreme court. In the Fifth Nebraska, 1861, we find a case which determines the constitutionality of this point."

Under the revenue statutes of this state, the assessor does not fix the value upon all taxable property. The owner values his "money" and the assessor values his "property" and the assessor values his "share in incorporated companies" in every instance, except when the owner takes the prescribed oath, then the assessor determines their value.

Regarding the powers of the tax commissioner, about which so much has been said, it was held by the court that his present powers were acquired or given to him under the old section 98, and were not imparted to him or newly acquired under the new revenue act.

Enjoined from Enforcing It. It was therefore decreed, finally, that the tax commissioner is temporarily enjoined from attempting to enforce the provisions of the new revenue law and that the returns made by property owners did not have to include answers to the alleged incriminating questions and neither did they have to contain the word "None" after each question, where it might suitably be placed.

Following the decision Mr. Switzer, the plaintiff, stated that since City Attorney Wright had previously given the tax commissioner explicit instructions, which the latter had obviously disregarded—special reference being had to a letter submitted by Mr. Wright to Mr. Fleming, earlier in the year, in which Mr. Wright, as city attorney, held that it was unnecessary for property owners to submit answers to the alleged incriminating interrogatories—the plaintiff had secured all they sought by this suit and that the statements embodied in Mr. Wright's letter to Mr. Fleming, together with the decision of the court, had secured for the plaintiff all that they desired and that there was no further need of pressing the suit.

MAYOR INSISTS ON REPAIRS

Orders Engineering Department to Push Barber People into Fixing the Streets.

Orders have been given by Mayor Moore to the engineering department to insist that the Barber Asphalt company immediately repair asphalt streets under expiring guaranty contracts.

"The Barber people have been trying to embarrass the present repairs of asphalt by the city on streets where the repair contract has expired," said Comptroller Lobeck, "but they have failed to attend to their own affairs and repair those streets which they are obliged to do free of cost. I do not know how much repairing of this class is necessary, but I propose to find out and insist that it be done. These streets are to be repaired by the company which does the work as they do, being entirely different from other headache remedies."

BOYD IS NOT A POSSIBILITY

Former Governor of Nebraska a Native of Ireland and Therefore Excluded from White House.

"No," said Governor Boyd yesterday as he smoked calmly at a superior cigar in the rotunda of the theater, "I could never be vice-president of the United States. I was born in Ireland."

WILL TABULATE BIDS MONDAY

County Commissioners Adjourn Till Then Owing to Multiplicity of Proposals.

Owing to the multiplicity of bids submitted for the repair work to be done on the county road, the county commissioners adjourned yesterday to meet again on Monday, when the bids will be arranged in tabulated form.

A proposition looking to the placing of fire extinguishers in the court house, jail and county hospital, was referred to the committee on supplies.

Ole Olson and S. McCarty were awarded a contract for 800 yards of grading, adjoining Melius' road, near Seymour park. The contract amounts to \$100.

A petition was presented by citizens who desire the Bowman road opened across the B. & M. railroad tracks.

The action on new bridges was deferred until the next meeting also. It is proposed to build a number of small bridges throughout the county where there is a pressing need for them before the advent of winter.

WILL ENTERTAIN SICK ONES

Musicians Will Play for Hospital Patients, Whom Governor Also Will Visit.

This afternoon at 12:30 o'clock there will depart from Eighteenth and Farnam streets a party of thirty-five musicians, under the leadership of Alton Hunter, on a visit to St. Joseph's hospital to give a sacred concert for the special benefit and entertainment of the patients at that institution and in honor of the Creighton Memorial hospital and the Sisters of St. Francis.

At 2 o'clock Governor Mickey, accompanied by W. G. Templeton and Councilman Charles Huntington, will make an official visit to the hospital. Arrangements have been pending for the pleasant affair for about ten days under the auspices of Frank Dunlop and D. J. O'Brien.

COUNTRY LADS LAND IN JAIL

Fair from Sarpy County Held Pending the Arrival of Sheriff.

On information from the authorities of Sarpy county the police have arrested Jay Wyman and Benny Thomas, a pair of country farmer lads in whom the news chant to steal is said to be abnormally developed. The information regarding the young men from their home county says that the disappearance of a wagon load of apples has been traced to them and that they are under suspicion of having committed the crime of burglary by entering a farm house and stealing several small and practically worthless articles. 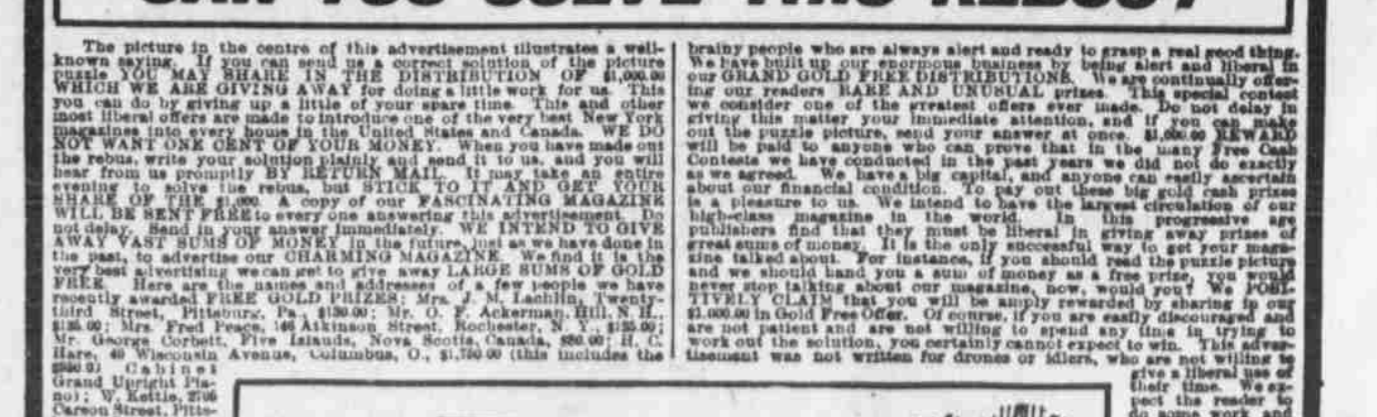
