BARNES RUNS AHEAD OF MICKEY'S VOTE

Sullivan, However, is Making a Better Bun Than Hollenback.

REPUBLICANS LEAD ON PRESENT RETURNS

Comparisons Are Being Made with Vote of Two Years Ago.

THEN TWELVE THOUSAND REPUBLICAN

Indications that Total Vote Will Be Somewhat Larger Than that Cast for Sedgwick and Hollenbeck.

At the hour of going to press the returns from Nebraska are coming in slowly, 213 precincts outside of Douglas having been heard from, casting more than 30,-000 votes. Out of this number Barnes rep., had 10,695 and Sullivan dem., 14,037. The same precinct two years ago gave Sedgwick a majority of 608 more than they give Barnes this year, indicating that Sullivan is running better than Hollenbeck did then. Barnes, however, is considerably ahead in these precincts of the vote given for governor a year ago.
