There was a persistent rumor here during the last few days that a movement was on foot looking to the independence of the isthmus. News of yesterday was the time mentioned for its active inauguration, but no event publicly antagonistic to the government of Colombia took place.

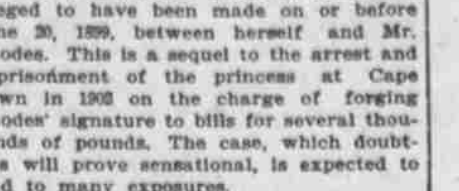
