## **CRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET**

Oan Better Excort Demand Wheat Shows a Fair Advance in Price.

CORN PRICES ARE SOMEWHAT HIGHER

Oats Market Followed Other Grains, Closing at Higher Prices-Provisions Were Easier and Prices Lower.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.-After ruling weak he greater part of the day, wheat turned on a better export demand and closng prices showed a fair advance, Deember being up 1/2c. December corn was c to 3/2c higher, oats were up 3/26/4c, but cember being up %c. December corn was %c to %c higher, oats were up %3%c, but provisions were weak, the January products closing from 6c to 7%c to 20c tower. Firm cables caused a better tone in wheat at the start, and December opened a shade to %2%c higher, at 78%c to 78%c. Confirmation of a report that 1,00,000 sushels of No. 1 northern had been chartered at Duluth to come here brought out quite general liquidation early in the session and the market turned weak, December selling off to 77%c within the first hour of trading. On the decline there was a good demand from shorts and commission houses and with lessened offerings prices again started upward. The strength in form was a buil factor during the latter part of the day, as were higher prices in outside markets, with a fair advance at St. Louis. Reports of over eighty boatloads taken for export caused a sharp demand from shorts during the last few minutes of trading and closing prices were at the top notch of the day, December being up %c at 78% 215%c. Clearances of wheat and flour were equal to 44,500 bushels. Primary receipts were 1,342,600 bushels, against 1,500,200 bushels a year ago. Exports of wheat and flour for the week were equal to 4,340,000 bushels, compared with 5,715,000 bushels last year. Minneapolis and Duluth reported receipts of 200 cars—none of contract grade—made total receipts for the three points of 978 cars, against 29 cars last week and 1,083 cars a year ago.

The sentiment in the corn pit was bullish and the market ruled strong. Theere were reports from Nebruska and other sections of the corn beit showing a good deal of soft grain, and the theory upon which the local crowd was working was that in about another week or ten days the pressure from the old corn would be over, and this poor corn would then begin to come on the market. Commission houses were active buyers, but offerings were only moderate. After selling between 44%c and 41%c, December closed 48%c higher at 44%c44%c. Local receipts were 27 cars, with twenty-three of contract grade.

Oats were strong, particularly the December option, which was influenced largely by a strong cash situation, and the strength of the nearby deliveries helped the more distant ones. The bullish feeling in corn influenced a good deal of buying by the local crowd. The close was at the top, with December %c higher at 25%c, after ranging between 35%c and 35%c. Local receipts were 185 cars.

Provisions were dull and easier along with a decline in the price of hogs. Packers were credited with moderate sales, but the buying was scattered. January pork closed 12%c lower at \$12.00. January lard was down 20c at \$5.75 and ribs were off 525%c at \$5.71496.30.

NEW YORK STOCKS AND BONDS

Railroad Securit'es Show Inclination Toward Higher Levels of Prices.

STEEL STOCK MAKES A NEW LOW MARK

Dealers Face With Equanimity an Expected Poor Showing; as Much Money Has Been Sent West.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—The stock market was submerged again today under deluge of United States Steel stocks. The general list, however, responded much less readily to the depressing influence of the steel liquidation than was the ease yesterday. Whenever the severe pressure on the steel stocks was suspended, as happened at intervals, the railroad stocks railied easily, so that their level of prices was above last night for about as much of the time as it was below. The market closed in one of the intervals when there was no pressure on steel, so that prices elsewhere were rising and were well above last night. Union Pacific and Pennsylvania show a gain of a point on the day and a number of the New York corporation stocks somewhat more. The early liquidation in the steel shares was very violent, as is shown by the fact that the sales of the preferred for the first hour alone were well above 190,000 shares. It is not to be supposed that this enormous volume of dealings was wholly liquidation. The roof professionals traded in and out of the stocks on a very large scale all day. It was said of one trader who was very active in the stock all day that he was neither long nor short for more than ten minutes at a time, while the aggregate of his individue; dealings amounted to many thousands of shares. The low price touched for the common stock was 19½, for the preferred 52 and for the bonds 65%. The relatively greater weakness of the preferred stock than the bonds was noticeable in view of the supported conversion operation by the syndicate which would in consequence be for sale.

There were some rather specific allegations, also, that some of the selling was traceable to sources from which it might be prompted by changes in the executive department of the corporation.

The stock market seemed to face with equanimity the prospect of another poor bank showing tomorrow. In addition to the losses to the subtreasury of \$7.091.000 the banks have made not shipments by direct express to the west and south of upwards of \$5,000,000. The indicated cash decrease of more than \$10,000,000 is about equal to the surplus reserve shown by the banks in last week's statement. The stock market community seemed to rest in a sense of security that this threatening showing somehow would be averted from reflection in tomorrow's bank statement as it was last week and for two weeks preceding.
