# LEVI CARTER PASSES AWAY

Pioneer Business Man of Omaha Dies at Paxton Hotel Arartments.

FUNERAL WILL BE PRIVATE AFFAIR

President of Carter White Lend Company, Whose Chicago Plant is Largest in the World.

Levi Carter, one of the wealthlest and oldest inhabitants of Omaha, died yesterday morning at 4 o'clock in his apartments at the Paxton hotel. He was 70 years old and had been ill a week with bronchitis and acute Bright's disease. A widow, but children survive him. Other immediate relatives are Dr. M. Carter of Belleville. Bla., and B. S. Carter of Sloux Falls, S. D. both being brothers, and Fred M. Carter and Percy Carter, who are nephews. Besides these are two sisters, who live abroad from Omaha and many lesser relatives.

The estate left by Mr. Carter is estimied at values ranging from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000. Aside from the Carter White Lead company, he had extensive holdings in real estate in Nabraska. Ohio and other states.

Mr. Carter was born in New Hampshire and came to Nebrasks in 1856. He was nesociated for many years with General Isaac Coe under the firm name of Coe & Carter. This firm did a heavy freighting business across the plains before the Union Pacific ratiroad was constructed. Later they supplied the Union Pacific, Oregon Short line and other railways with ties for many years. For a period they were engaged extensively in the cattle business at North Platts.
