Fine Program Prepared for the Meeting to Be Held in December.

DECIDE ON NEXT YEAR'S STATE FAIR THEN

Plans Go Awry and Announced Change in Editorial Management of Register-Lender Will Not Take Place.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)
DES MOINES, Nov. 7.-(Special.)-The State Agricultural institute in connection with the annual meeting of the lows Department of Agriculture will be held in Des Moines December 7-9, and an unusually fine program has been arranged for this meetng. There will be a corn exposition in con nection therewith and prizes aggregating nearly \$200 have been offered for corn. Prof. Holden of the State coilege will do the judging. 'The convention will be in the Young Men's Christian association rooms, the policy of holding the state institutes in the state capitol has been found to be unsatisfactory. The department meeting will slect the officers for the state fair next year and probably render a decision as to whether there will be a fair at all in view of the St. Louis exposition. The program icludes a fine line of speakers, and it has een designed that it shall be of a popular character, so that there will be a large general attendance. The array of talent is arger than at any previous state institute. In addition to the papers there will be the reports of President W. W. Morrow of Afton, Treasurer G. D. Ellyson of Des Moines and Secretary J. C. Simpson of Knoxville.

Proclaimed Thanks in lows

Governor A. B. Cummins today issued his proclamation for Thanksgiving day. A conference was held today by Judge Carruthers of the State Exposition board with the state geologist and manufacturers of clay products to determine what can be one toward making an exhibit for Iowa at St. Louis of clay and clay products. It was decided that an exhibit of the manufac-tured products will be made, and this will ome under the manufactures department. In connection with this there was consideration of plans for a display of the wonfron ore deposits in Allamakee coupty, where there is a mineral ridge with \$20,000,000 worth of mineral in sight. The iron ore deposits have never been worked because they are so far removed from the river or from railroads, but plans are under way for the development of the

According to the vote cast at the last election the situation is changed in the Seventh district, so that it will take three counties to nominate a candidate. Heretofore the large vote in Polk county has been sufficient to leave it so that with one other delegation Polk county can make a nomination. The changed situation renders it probable that the outside counties will combine to nominate a candidate and defeat any resident of Des Molnes.

Newspaper Changes. The sale is announced of the Svithiod, a Swedish newspaper which has been pub-

lished weekly in Des Moines the last twenty years. It was owned recently by a stock ompany, at the head of which was Senator Ericson of Boone. It has been sold to the publishers of a Swedish newspaper in Minneapolis. There is now no other Swedish paper printed in the state, save one at Sloux City of limited circulation.

Plans Go Awry.

Maytag of Newton will not take place and Mr. Funk will not become the editor. Gardner Cowles and other friends of Harvey Ingham, the present editor, have secured control of the majority of the stock.

Oleomargarine Case. The case involving the right to sell elecmargarine in Iowa was submitted to the district court today on a demurrer. The Armour company was indicted as a test case to determine whether the product sold in the state is sufficiently yellow to violate the Iowa law.

Capacity. TOUNGSTOWN, O., Nov. 7 .- J. G. Butler, jr., president of the Bessemer Pig Iron association, gave out the following statement this morning of pig iron production of independent and association furnaces after yesterday's meeting in Pittsburg: I have received information from the various pig iron producers in the central west, embracing Pittsburg and vicinity, the Wheeling district, the Mahoning and Shensudoah valleys, southern Ohio, Columbus and Cleveland, that production in October was 35 per cent less than capacity. On November 1 the statistics show a reduction of 49 per cent less than capacity. It is believed this percentage will hold good during November.
