GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Small Receipts Sends Price of Wheat Up One Cent and a Ouarter.

CORN FOLLOWS LEAD OF SMALLER GRAIN

Onts Move Up in Price Sympathetleally, While Provisions Are Steady at Small Decline for All Products.

CHICAGO, Nov. ia.—The prediction of smaller receipts in the northwest was realized today when a considerable falling off in arrivals of wheat was shown in spite of favorable weather for the movement, and as a result the market ruled strong. December closing at an advance of Nic. December corn was up 16%c, oats were 1146 ligher, while provisions closed about unchanged.

The leature in trading in the wheat pit was the urgent demand for the December delivery, while at the same time there was very little on the market, and as a result of this combination the price took a sharp upturn. With the exception of the continued favorable weather conditions in general favored the buils, cables being higher, receipts in the northwest smaller and the cash demand much improved. The close was at 19279%c, a gain of 1691%c. Clearances of wheat and flour were equal to 172,000 bu. Primary receipts were 1,237,300 bu., against 1,518,200 bu, a year ago. Minneapolis, Duluth and Chicago reported receipts of 618 cars, against 870 cars last week and 851 cars a year ago.

During the early part of the session there was a tendency on the part of local bears to self corn, influenced by the favorable weather and lower cables, and prices held steady. Late in the day the strength in wheat brought out a fairly good demand, and with smaller offerings the market became stronger and closing prices were at the top, December being up %4%c at 42%c, after selling between 41%c and 42%c. Local receipts were 129 cars, with 8 of contract grade.

Provisions ruled steady at a small decline for all products. Liberal receipts of hogs and lower prices at the yards had a depressing influence. About the only feature was the selling of January lard by a commission house and buying by pit traders. January pork closed unchanged at \$11.47%, lard was 24%5c lower at \$6.6, with ribs unchanged at \$6.16.
