Former Iowa Executive Receives Eudden Call to Rest.

PRINCIPAL

Had Been III at His Home in Centerville for Some Time, but Denth Not Considered Im-

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, Nov. 29 .- (Special.) -- Ex Governor Francis Marion Drake died at his home in Centerville today. His death was not wholly unexpected, as he was yesterday taken with a severe attack of diabetes, an old trouble with him. Two years ago General Drake had a fall, which came near ending his life. He had generally had good health in recent years, and was busy with his large interests and with plans for aiding Drake university, in this city, which he helped to found twenty years ago. It is believed that his estate is worth at least \$3,000,000, the major portion of which has been accumulated since he retired from the office of governor. What disposition was made of this estate is not known, but it is known that in one will made by the general he divided it equally between his five children and Drake university, giving the university a sixth part of the estate. It is regarded as possible, however, that he has made a later will, and may have changed the bequests, but

bears his name, and into which he has given so much of his life and money. General Francis Marion Drake was born in Rushville, Ill., December 30, 1830, his parents being natives of North Carolina. When Francis was 7 years old his parents moved to southern Iows, and the boy was common school education. It was on his first expedition, when he was in command of twenty men going to the gold fields, that he had a memorable encounter with a band of 200 Pawnee Indians at the crossing of Shell creek, in Nebraska. He drove off the indiana and went on his way. In 1864 he was a passenger on the steamer Yankee Blade.
