NEW YORK STOCKS AND BONDS

Increase in Dealings Accompanied by Evidence of Conspicuous Streng h.

PART OF EARLY GAIN LATER WIPED OUT

General Feeling on Market is That Effect of Trade Conditions Has Been Discounted and Prices Will Advance.

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—There was a considerable increase in the volume of dearing on the stock exchange today, accompanied by a period of conspicuous strength. Dealing in some stocks was in evidence at all times and this tendency spread through the market until it became top-heavy and turned downwards, wiping out part of the early gain. An upward spurt in two or three of the industrial speciaties at the last parity railled the market, but realizing again met the advance and the closing was active and irregular.

The conspicuous movements at the last were a jump of 4½c in Colorado Fuel, 7½c in the Colorado Fuel convertible bonns, 3½c in sugar and 1½c in Amalgamated Copper. The fact that there was no news to account for these sudden jumps aggravated the distrust with which they were regarded by traders who were trying to seil at other points of the market. The persistent pressure upon Pennsylvania was a drag upon the market from the outset, but it was overcome by a succession of buying movements at other points which gradually dissipated the uneasiness. Buying for London account was a factor in the advance.
