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BANK ASSESSMENTS GO UP

Board of Review Levies Show Increase of Fifty-Six Thousand Dollars.

NO CHANGE IN THE METHODS EMPLOYED

Much Confusion Caused by Plan to Assess Mortgages, but Board Will Support Commissioner Fleming.

Assessments of the national banks, as fixed by the Board of Review at a late session Saturday night, show a net increase over last year of \$56,000. Notices were sent to each bank, advising them of the decision of the board and notifying the officers to appear Monday if they have facts to find. 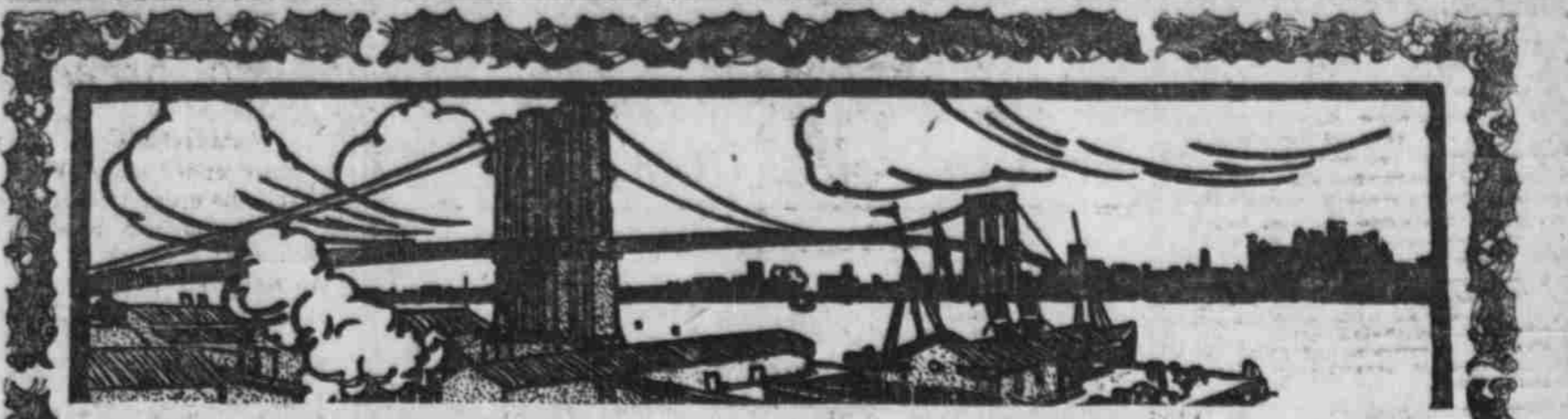
