Sweet Potato Pic-Peel, boil and mast sufficient potatoes to make one pint of pulp, add to them one pint of sweet milk, three eggs beaten light without separating, half a cup of granulated sugar, one teaspoonful of vanilla, or half a teaspoonful of ginger, cinnamon and a level tea poonful of ginger. Mix well and por into deep pie tins lined with a light paste and bake in a moderate oven for half an hour. Sweet Potato Bread-Place one pint o lukewarm water in the mixing bowl, add one tablespoonful of butter, one level tablespoonful of salt, half a cup of good yeast or half a compressed yeast cake which has been dissolved in four table-spoonsfuls of lukewarm water, sift in one quart of flour, beat well and stand in s warm place over night. In the morning bake four sweet potatoes, scoop out the pulp and mash through a sieve into the sponge, beat well and add sufficient flour to make a soft dough. Knead lightly, roll out and cut into biscults. Place these in greased baking pans and very lightly bake in a quick oven twenty-five minutes. When

Place again in the oven until thoroughly Southern Sweet Potato Pudding-Wash and boil two pounds of sweet potatoes very soft, but not soggy. Mash the patatoes while warm and add one cupful of butter and beat the mixture until very light in color. Beat four eggs very light with one cup of white sugar and stir them into the mixture, stirring rapidly. Add grated nutmeg to taste, half a pint of sherry wine, one pint of rich milk and the grated yellow peel of one lemon. Mix turn into the pudding dish and bake in a quick oven. Delicious.

Sweet Potato Cones-Bake six large sweet potatoes; when done scoop out the pulp. Line the bottom of the baking dish with buttered paper, arrange the potato mixture in liftle cones; on this brush with beaten egg and brown in a quick oven. Place a little chopped paraley on the top of each cone, arrange on a hot platter and garnish with a wreath of curied paraley.

Sweet Potato Biscuit-Boil a sufficient

number of sweet potatoes to make one quart after they are grated, add to the grated potato half a cup of butter and one cup of yeast; mix with either milk or water; allow them to rise twice and bake like tea biscuit.
