What Constitutes Gambling.

The court finds as a matter of law:
That betting or seiling pools on a horse race is gambling within the meaning of the statutes of this state.

The act of keeping and maintaining a room where the public is invited to come for the purpose of betting on horse races and for the purpose of buying and seiling pools on horse races constitute the offense of keeping a room to be used or occupied for gambling within the statutes of the state of Nebraska.
