REVIEW OF BUSINESS YEAR

Bradstreet's Finds Year Just C osed One of Irregu ar Trade.

Ninetrees bundred and three was a year of freegularity in speculation, distributive trade and isdustry in some cases of severe strains, variously applied and as differently withstood. As the residuary legates of at least five years of great prosperity, it had to bear cumulative effects of previous years' mistakes and at the same time to carry burdens having their inception in the year itself. Yet the tests were well withstood, and while excesses occurred the course of events so far has proved that the genetal trade foundation was essentially sound and that the structure reared upon it was in the main well built.

Stock market liquidation, though slow, has been apparently thorough, and while many weak spots have been found ordinary trade, has had some hope to gradually readjust iffelf to changed conditions of supply and demand without the imperilment which would have followed a speculative crash such as has been freely predicted would close the present period of prosperity. Among the causes leading to unsettlement in stock speculation and later in important industries, the report gives "the figury to sentiment growing out of disclosures of overdoing, to put it mildly, in industrial stock fluctuations." Searcity in money supplies due to absorption by these Sotations and to heavy borrowings by railronds, the feeling that a subsidence of the rampant activity of preceding years was inevitable, but chiefly the effects of enhanced cost at which business was done, High-priced raw materials, increased transportation rates, enlarged cost of manufacture, and last, but not least, the manifest determination of labor to get all that the traffic would bear, the review states, were all elements tending to check consumption.

Summarizing the year's developments, the review cails attention to the excellent condition of trade and industry during the first quarters, and the multiplication of labor troubles during the second quarter, June 1 seeing the largest number of menout of employment in many years. Building construction at many large cities was checked, and it was practically at a standstill at New York throughout the summer. The high price of cotton caused the more of less constant idleness of 2,000,000 spindles and 100,000 operatives in the middle of the year, while reductions in wages of many thousands of workers in the last months impaired the purchasing ability of the industrial element. The crop situation was less favorable than earlier anticipated, but better prospects later helped out fall trade. Stock market liquidation and numerous suspensisms caused some tension in October and November, but ordinary failures continued smaller in number, though liabilities were larger than a year ago. Clearings reflected duliness in stock speculation and showed decreases from 1902 and 1901. November and December showed a more optimistic tone in general business, though trade in dry goods was unsettled by the enormous advance in cotton. Trade as a whole was probably in excess of 1902. The wheat crop was slightly less than that of 1902 and corn and cotton were affected by the late spring, floods, and early frosts, the yields of the country's crops as a whole falling behind 1902.

Manufacturing industry was feverishly active early, in the year, iron and steel leading. Curtailment following reduction in prices, cut-down of output and liberal export movement started. Lumber and building material felt the decline in activity. The cut probably will run 10 percent below 1802. Shoe manufacturing was active and shipments from eastern centers groeeded 1802 by 15 per cent, and 1801, the best on record, by 4 per cent. The wool elle was 10 per cent less than 1802, but sold at an advance over 1802. Cotten manufacturing struggled against advances of 5 to 56 per cent in raw material, compared with increases of 10 to 35 per cent in goods and the stik industry also was affected by high raw material. Anthracitic coal was active, soft cent was strong and brick early, weakening ister and coke showed great extremes in prices. Export trade amounting to \$1.455.00.000 showed a 7 per cent increase over 1802 and imports of \$1,000.000 make the aggregate of foreign trade the best on record.

Reduced stock speculation at the metropolis cut down the bank clearings at New York 13 per cent from 1902, but the country as a whole showed a 4 per cent gain over 1802. Prices early in the year evidenced the strength of demand, reaching on March 10 the highest level for three years past. Metals, live stock, meats, hides and leather, coal and coke reacted, but breadstuffs, textiles, mineral oils, building materials, coffee and miscellaneous, products finished higher. Car congestion was complained of early, but facilities were greatly expanded later and continuing heavy business was economically handled. Gross railroad earnings and net receipts gained 18 per cent over 1802. A disquicting feature in the business mortality was the larger number of heavy manufacturing suspensions. Immigration was the largest ever known.

Producers attility to take lower prices is, of course, predicted upon the acceptance of decreased wages by employes. Expenditures for engineering purposes, while helpful to demand, may restrict supplies of money for ordinary business. The presidential campaign may also be unsettling, though not, as in previous years, a source of financial disquiet. The strength of the agricultural interest makes for confidence in good trade in the country's basic industry. Building operations bear a better appearance. Free exports of excess manufactures and minerals are to be expected, but as yel no evidences exist of overproduction. Up to the middle of 1903 the country had been traveling at a swift pace, but to marked signs of over-extension are visible. Moreover, the United States of today is in a far stronger position than it was ten or even five years ago and we owe less abroad than ever before. There are still some cloud shadows, but the barometer has begun to rise and the commercial world may expect a fairly satisfactory business along lines of confident conservatism, governed as the year advances by crop and industrial developments of 1904.
