AMONG THE HOME MAKERS

Semi-Annual Report of the Omah Association Shows Flattering Progress.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Omaha Loan and Building association in The Bee building, Wednesday evening the regular semi-annual dividend of 3 per cent was declared.

The report of the association's busines for the half-year period shows steady progress in frugality and home getting. In round numbers the earnings amounted to \$25,600. From this will be deducted the dividend. \$17,300, and expenses, \$4.200, leaving a balance of \$4,000 for the reserve fund.

During the six months the association's assets increased \$45,000, and during the year \$114,000, the present total being \$686,600. A significant feature of the report, reflecting local industrial condition, is the increase in withdrawals. During the first half of the year, withdrawals amounted to \$78.400 and in the last half \$89,900, a total of \$168 .-200. The greater part of this sum was invested in homes. Evidence of local prosperity is supplied in an equally gratifying way by the marked increase in loans repaid and cancelled. The total for the year was \$119,600, more that double that of the preceding year.


