MAY OPTION IS THREE CENTS HIGHER

Corn Advances in Price Nearly Two Cents, While Onts Are Somewhat Higher, as Are Also Provisions.

CHICAGO, Jan. 2.—Fessimistic advices from European capitals in regard to the possibility of war in the far east caused an advance of 34c in May wheat, 25c in corn and 75c in pork today. While all of the advances did not hold, closing prices were near the top.

War news was the chief topic of conversation before the session opened and when the bell rang for the opening of business there was a rush of buying orders in the wheat pit. No sellers were to be found, however, As a result initial sales showed a range of an even 2c on May, the price being \$45,050 c. which was an advance of \$40 c over Thursday's close. Shorts were active buyers and the price rose rapidly. At \$75c there was considerable liquidation and the price settled back to 87c. The defhand continued good at all times, however, and the market railled on all small recessions. The feature of trading was a lack of efferings. On account of the mounting for the victims of the Iroquois fire the board closed an hour earlier than is usual on Saturdays. The shortened session added to the activity. May closed at \$75c. a gain of 3c over Thursday's close. The July option also showed good gains, and after ranging between 80c and \$25c, closed with a gain of \$235c at \$25,9525c. Cearances of wheat and flour were equal to 502,000 bu. Frimary receipts were 1,027,000 bu. against 49,000 bu. a year ago. Minneapelis, Duluth and Chicago reported receipts of 612 cars, against \$25 cars a year ago.

The corn market was influenced by the same conditions that governed wheat and prices showed sharp advances. Shorts covered freely and there was also a good investment demand, while offerings were extremely light. Unfavorable weather and small receipts were minor factors in helping the advance. May opened by to 4675c, higher at 4554946c to 465c, and after selling up to 475c, closed at 47549475c. Local receipts were 164 cars, with three of contract grade.

The oats market started slow, but was soon influenced by the strength in wheat and corn, and showed a fair advance. There was good buying by some of the recent sellers and the offerings came largely from commission houses. After opening a shade to 4c higher at 384c to 3846884c, May ranged between 284c and 39c, closing at 384c, a gain of 8c. Local receipts were 106 cars.

Pork ruled the provision list in a sensational advance and at one time was 75c higher for May over the low point of the 12.7. The war scare and fotal absence of altiveries on January contracts were the influences that caused the higher prices. Offerings were light throughout the entire session. Buying by shorts was the chief factor. After ranging between \$13.07% and \$13.82% May pork closed 57%c higher at \$13.90.
