PORTO RICANS NOT ALIENS United States Supreme Court So Decides in the Old Gonanies

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.-In an opinion by

Chief Justice Fuller the supreme court of the United States today decided that the citizens of Porte Rico are not allens of the United States and that they are entitled to enter this country without obstruction. The opinion was delivered in the case of the Porto Rican woman Gonzales who, in 1902, was refused admisison to the port of New York on the ground that she was likely to become a public charge. The decision was based entirely on the immigration act of 1891 and took the ground that
