MAYNARD IS THE PRESIDENT

Board of Education Elects Its New Head Without Difficulty. CHRISTIE TO HOLD SECOND PLACE Organization for Year's Work Put Through Without Friction at the First Meeting of the Board.

The 1904 Board of Education convened organized last night with James W. Maynard as president and Dr. W. H. Christie as vice president. The arrangement was understood in advance, and no difficulty was encountered in carrying it out.

Two ballots were necessary for Maynard as against 21 for McIntosh. The first vote standing: Christie, 5; Finkhouser, 5; McIntosh, 2; Deweller, 2. The second ballot resulted: Christie, 10; McIntosh, 2; Deweller, 2; Finkhouser, 1. The latter had withdrawn his name, saying he did not care for the honor the third time.

Neither presiding officer made anything that could be called a speech. The old rules were adopted. The new members are John L. McCague, Dr. J. H. Vance and H. L. Kreider. Members Maynard and Theodore H. Johnson entered upon their second term.

ASKS CONGRESSMEN'S NAMES

Representative from Virginia Would Know Who Had Favors from Beavers.

WANTS POSTAL CASES INVESTIGATED When House Votes on Question There is No Quorum Present and Adjournment is Taken Until Morning.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—At the opening of the senate the chairman prayed for peace between Japan and Russia.

The resignation of Mr. McClellan (N. Y.) was announced. Mr. Hay, dem. (Va.) offered a privileged resolution as follows: Whereas, The fourth assistant postmaster general, in his report to the postmaster general dated October 24, 1903, and which report has been transmitted to a committee of this house, has charged that long-lease for postage premises were cancelled without notice...

Resolved, That the speaker of this house appoint a committee consisting of five members of this house to investigate said charges, the said committee having power to send for persons and papers, to enforce the production of the same; to examine witnesses under oath; to have power to sit during the sessions of the house and to exercise all the rights of a committee in the investigation of the said charges and to report the result of said investigation as soon as practicable.

Mr. Gardner (N. J.) raised a point of order, contending that there was no specific charge against any member of this congress.

Mr. Hay contended that the resolution was privileged and he was supported by Mr. Williams (Mass.), the minority leader, who insisted that it was due the membership of the house that such an investigation be made.

SENATE OPENS WITH PANAMA

First Session After Adjournment Listens to Speeches on New Republic.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—The senate's first session following the holiday season was devoted entirely to Panama. President Roosevelt sent a message on the subject, which was received with great interest.

Mr. Morgan of Alabama stated his preference for the Nicaragua route and maintained that the present course of the administration was breaking down the established policy of the United States regarding neutrality.
