HIS TESTIMONY ATTRACTS A CROWD

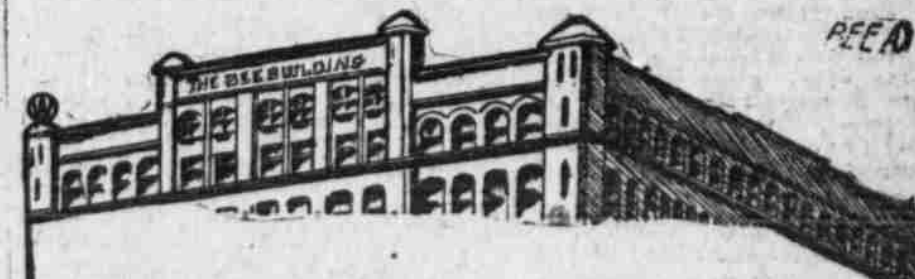
