INCREASES THE PENSION LIST

House Passes 209 Bills and Resolution Seeking Information.

BILL REMOVING DUTY FROM EXHIBITS

Articles Donated at St. Louis Exposition to Religious, Scientific and Educational Institutions Will Escape Usual Tax.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—The house today passed 209 pension bills and also resolution calling on the secretary of war and the attorney general for information as to the number of horses and carriages maintained at government expense. A bill permitting the withdrawal of free from the St. Louis exposition of articles donated to religious, scientific, educational or literary institutions also passed.

DEBATE GORMAN RESOLUTION

Senate Also Takes Up Question of Recession Appointments Following Extra Session of Congress.

FORAKER REPORTS ON OHIO

Senator Tells President Result of His Visit to the State.

HOPE TO KEEP DOWN BITTER CONTEST

Efforts Being Made to Bring the Two Senators from the State Into Accord Regarding Delegation.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—A conference which, though brief, was pregnant with significance, was held at the White House today between the president and Senator Foraker. The senator returned yesterday from a sojourn of several days in Ohio, where he conferred with many of his friends regarding the political situation.

FRANCE MAY INCREASE DUTIES

A movement is making for an agreement between the governments of the United States and France in lieu of the projected reciprocity treaty, which has not received the approval of the senate and consequently has failed through the expiration of the period of time allowance for ratification and exchange. The French government has let it be known that it contemplates a considerable increase of duties on imported meats. An effort on the part of Ambassador Feltus to secure the minimum rates for American goods disclosed the fact that some concession must be made in return by the United States. A recourse has been had to section 2 of the Dingley tariff act, and if this projected arrangement should take effect the outcome would be one of the commercial agreements which will require no action on the part of the United States senate.
