

FORAKER REPORTS ON OHIO

Benator Tells President Result of His Visit to the State.

SHOPE TO KEEP DOWN BITTER CONTEST

Efforts Being Made to Bring the Two Senators from the State, Into Accord Regarding Dele-

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 .- A conference which, though brief, was pregnant with significance, was held at the White House today between the president and Senator Foraker. The senator returned yesterday from a sojourn of several days in Ohio where he conferred with many of hi friends regarding the political situation. It was to inform the president of the result of his observations that he called on

It seems improbable at this time that Benator Foraker will precipitate a contest in Ohio over the selection of delegates to the Chicago convention,

It is known that many close friends of president believe that nothing would be gained by such a contest, whatever the result of it might be. Efforts are being ade now to bring Senators Hanna and Poraker together in the selection of Ohio's national delegates. It is known that between Senator Hanna's close friends there is a disposition to attempt to relegate Sen ator Foraker to the rear if he desires to go to the Chicago convention as a delegate-atlarge, provided that no contest which might imperil the integrity of the republican organization in the state is made.

Today's conference lasted only a short time, but the situation was discussed in its nament features. It is understood that the president will not permit himself to be drawn into any factional trouble, either in Ohio or in any other state.

Senator Foraker understands the prestdent's position in this regard. The conference today was not prolonged, because the senator had an engagement for a committee meeting which he was obliged to keep, but it is likely that a further and fuller discussion of the matter will be had at a later time.

The secretary of the interior has awarded bids for 95 per cent of the merchantable pine timber of 89,707 acres included in the first section of the Minnesota national forest reserve in the Cass lake region. The aggregate of the bids is \$1,218,122, and the timber, which is located on 215 sections, consists of 193,786,000 feet, of which 121,441 good feet is Norway pine and the remainder white pine.

BILL REMOVING DUTY FROM EXHIBITS

Articles Donated at St. Louis Exposition to Religious, Scientific and Educational Institutions Will Escape Usual Tax.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.-The house today passed 209 pension cills and also resolutions calling on the secretary of war and the attorney general for information as to the number of horses and carriage maintained at government expense. A bill permitting the withdrawal duty free from the St. Louis exposition of articles donated to religious, scientific, educational or literary institutions also passed.

A resolution submitted by Mr. Jenkins (Wis.) from the committee on judiciary, calling on the attorney general for information as to the number of carriages maintained at the expense of the government for use of the officials of the Department of Justice was passed.

A bill to allow the free entry of any article not specifically imposed by incorporated institutions established for religious, philonophical, educational scientific or literary purposes, or by any state or municipal corporation when imported for exhibit a the St. Louis exposition and then donated to such institution was passed. DEBATE GORMAN RESOLUTION Senate Also Takes Up Question of Re-

cess Appointments Following Extra Session of Congress.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.-The senate to day adopted the resolution of inquiry concerning affairs in Panama, introduced or the 5th inst. by Mr. Gorman, and listened to a speech on the Panama question by Mr. Dolliver, and another on the subject of recess appointments. Following is the text of the Gorman reso-

lutions:

Resolved. That the president be requested if not, in his judgment, incompatible with public interest to inform the senate:

First. The date when and the circumstances under which the United States, for the first time and each succeeding time, used a military force in the internal affairs of New Granada, or Colombia, under the treaty of 1846; whether such use of military force was on the initiative of the United States or by the request of New Granada or Colombia, or in consequence of any official representation of either, and also to transmit to the senate copies of the letters, or notes, in the department of state, and of the orders by the navy department relating to such use of military force.

Second, Also to inform the senate whether

department relating to such use of military force.

Second. Also to inform the senate whether or not the United States has been asked by New Granada or Colombia, or any official representative of either, to execute by armed force, either the guaranty of the neutrality of the istinus or of the sovereignty of New Granada or Colombia over the same; and if the United States has been so asked, then the dates and circumstances thereof; and to send to the senate copies of the letters or notes in each case, conveying the application and what was done thereunder by the United States.

Third. And also to inform the senate in which, if any, of the disturbances on the isthmus of Panama referred to by the president in his last annual measage to the senate the United States used a military force solely on his own initiative and uninvited by the government owning the isthmus, and also to inform the senate of the circumstances in each case which required such use of military force, and transmit copies of the orders issued by the next department for such purpose.

Fourth. And also that he will inform the senate of the dates when and circumstances under which the United States has

employed military force in the internal affairs of New Granada or Colombia on account of any revolt or rebellion or disturbance of the people therein.

man. As a precedent for the president's recognition of Panama, Mr. Dolliver showed that President Pierce had recognized five revolutionary governments within four months.

Large Amount. CLEVELAND, Jan. 31.-The Produce Exchange bank, corner Broadway and Central avenue, closed its doors today. The insolvency court has appointed the Cleve-

land Trust company as receiver. The assets and liabilities of the bank are each placed at \$1,500,000. Attorney Andrew Squire, on behalf of the bank, made the following statement this afternoon:

There is a defalcation of \$170,000, which is more than the paid in capital and surplus combined. The original capital was \$200,000, but only \$50 per share was paid in. The depositors will he protected fully. The stockholders will have to pay in \$100,000 more on their capital stock and \$250,000 in stockholders liability.


