EXPERTS TALK OF POISONS In Blydenburgh Trial it is Said to Be Difficult to Trace

Source.

ELDORA, Ia., Jan. 28.-The defense in the Blydenburgh trial occupied the most of the day in introduction of expert testimony in an effort to prove that evidences of arsenical poisoning in the organs of the dead woman might have been produced from the embalming fluid used.

Dr. Pagelson of lowa Falls was the first witness today. He testified that it would be impossible to tell from an examination after death whether the arsenic found in the organs came there from the embaiming process or was administered prior to death. Dr. Charles H. Hoffman, expert chemist from Des Moines, testified to almost the same in substance. He was followed by experts from Marshalltown, Grinnell and other points, including Dr. E. W. Clarke of Iowa college. The state claims to have scored a victory in the testimony of the defendant's witnesses, it being alleged that their evidence is contradictory and will not, therefore, have weight with the jury.
