

MILWAUKEE TEAM SETS PACE

Lead Events at the Annual Bowling Tournament at Cleveland.

ALL THE TWO-MAN TEAMS ARE ON HAND

Peth and Weber, Crack Chicago Players Come in a Close Second in the First Series of Games.

CLEVELAND, Feb. 9.—At the fourth annual tournament the American Bowling congress today the highest score of the day for the two-man teams was made by Jones and Starke of Milwaukee, who rolled 1,372; the next highest being Elwert and Funcke of Belleville, Ill., with 1,170.

Peth of the Chicago delegation, the holder of the world's record for a series of three games in a match game, 300s, bowled with Weber, another Chicagoan. They came in a close second in the first series of games. All the two-man teams scheduled were on hand when play was started to-day except Becker and Herman, who did not appear.

In the third contest in two-man teams only nine men appeared on the alleys, No. 25 being in want on account of the failure of Nickel and Creimer, of Pittsburgh, to appear. All the men who fail to appear at the regular hour assigned for bowling will probably forfeit their right to bowl in the tournament unless an arrangement satisfactory to the congress is made to justify them on at times when the alleys are not full. 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STATE HARDWARE MEN MEET

Retail Dealers Plan Closer Association and Greater Mutual Protection.

WELCOMED TO CITY BY MAYOR MOORES

Members Were Banqueted Last Night at Commercial Club by Local Jobbers and Hardware Dealers.

Retail hardware dealers in large numbers are in Omaha to attend the convention of the Nebraska Retail Hardware Dealers' association, which convened at the Commercial club rooms yesterday. The headquarters of the association are at the Paxton and Merchants hotels, and representatives of the various wholesale establishments of this and adjacent cities are present to get acquainted with the convention members and have displays of their wares at both hotels.

The object of the convention is to perfect a permanent organization of all the hardware dealers of Nebraska for protective and educational purposes; to continue trade to its proper channels and to correct abuses that now exist in business life; to place the business of the retail dealer upon such a basis as will enable him to meet the changed conditions of business life and to secure the legitimate competition; to secure the enforcement of such laws as will protect the honest dealer from dishonest methods of trade combination; to promote between merchants a credit system with each other by correspondence.

Very little business was transacted in the morning. The afternoon session was called to order at 2 o'clock by President C. A. Peterson of Oakland, there being nearly 80 members and visitors present. An invocation was rendered by Rev. T. V. Moore and then followed the address of welcome by Mayor Moore of Omaha, which was responded to by C. K. Larson of Hastings. President Peterson then read his annual address, which was referred to a special committee. The address outlined the work of the association for the last year and congratulated the members on the growth of the organization and the excellent results of the association's work. Very few members have dropped out and the increase of membership has largely exceeded the losses.

Appointment of Committees. The remainder of the afternoon session was devoted to the appointment of committees and an address on "Hardware Insurance" by Secretary H. J. Hall of Lincoln. Today's program, beginning at 9:30 a. m. will comprise, first the report of the association secretary, an address on "The Parcel Post Bill" by National Secretary M. L. Corey of Argus, Ind., a paper on "Local Organization" by J. P. Goshner of Seward, paper on "Hardware Frontiers" by H. Henke Jr. of Grand Island, paper on "Competitors and Profits" by Max Uhlig of Holdrege, report of committees and opening of "question box".

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
