Contracts for Paving, Curbing and Laying Sidewalks Let by Council.

DAN HANNON GETS BIG PAVING JOB

Will Put Down Galesburg Brick or South Twenty-Fourth Street and Railroad Avenue This Spring.

At a meeting of the city council last night the contract for grading, curbing and paving South Twenty-fourth street from Q street to W street and Railroad avenue from W street to the Sarpy county line was awarded to Dan Hannon.

Seven bids for this work were opened by the street and alley committee, but two were thrown out on account of no samples of material having been submitted. The bidders for the entire work were: Dan Hannen, \$71,167; Zack Cuddington, \$67,932; George Parks, \$74,83; McGowan, \$71,645; Andrew Kiewit, \$80,444.

Councilman Adkins made several tests of the paying brick submitted and the committee decided that as Hannon had bid on Purington brick, made at Galesburg, Ill., which was considered by the council as the best brick, he was awarded the con-Hannon was about \$3,000 above the bid of Cuddington, but Cuddington and the others did not bid on Galesburg brick. Taking this matter into consideration, and the fact that his bid was considered lower on curbing, etc., there was no hesitation about the awarding of the contract.

All of the other bidders were given back their certified checks. The mayor and clerk were directed by the council to enter into a contract with Hannon for this work. Mr. Hannon says that he will commence getting material ready as soon as the contract is signed and that he will commence work as soon as the frost is out of the

After this matter of paving Railroad avenue had been disposed of the council took up the matter of permanent side walks. August Hamil offered to lay artificial stone walks for 16 cents and brick for 12% cents. George Parks bid 17 cents for cement and 12% cents for brick. The contract was awarded to Parks.

At a former meeting of the council the question of opening Thirty-fourth street from V street to the south line of St. Mary's cemetery came up. The street and alley committee reported favorably on this etition and the city attorney was directed to draft the proper ordinances.


