C. E. ADAMS CHOICE OF GOVERNOR MICKEY

Present Incumbent Wants Office Again, but So Do Several Others and Lively Game is Anticipated.

An impending election of a brigade commander for the Nebraska National guard is said to have become involved with state politics and among the local guardsmen a great deal of discussion has resulted.

The three-year term of General P. H. Barry of Greeley Cener terminates at the end of February and he is a candidate for re-election and has just sent out letters to all the officers asking their support in the eletion which will soon be called. Opposition to the general has been developed It is said that Governor Mickey is advocating the candidacy of C. E. Adams of Superior, a colonel on his staff and well known as a Grand army man. There are other candidates in the persons of the two regimenal commanders, Colonel Claris V. Talbott of Broken Bow of the First and Colonel J. W. McDonnell of Fairbury of the second. Colonel C. J. Bills of Fairbury formerly brigadier general and commander of the First regiment during the Spanish-American war and now inspector-general of the state, is said to be in the lists, also

Launch Adams' Boom,

In connection with Colonel Adams' candidney, it is asserted a recent order issued by Adjutant General Culver for an inspection of supplies and accounts by a "board of survey" is nothing more or less than the launching of a political excursion to work up enthusiasm for the Superior man. It is to be accomplished in connec tion with an inspection of the guard by an officer of the regular army and the board is composed of Majors Phelps, McLaughlin and Eberly. Major Phelps is assistant adjutant general in the pay of the state, while Major McLaughlin is said to owe rapid promotion to the grace of General Culver.

Three days ago notice was given that the inspectors would arrive in Omaha Wednes-day night. Local officers say the time is insufficient to prepare for the inquisition, as a detailed accounting of supplies on hand, missing, etc., is to be demanded. There are four infantry companies, the Omaha Guards, Thurston Rifles and Millard Rifles in Omaha, and the cavalry troop in South Omaha, to be inspected, and none are ready and will not be for several days

Important Strategie Point. Inasmuch as fourteen out of the ninety or 100 officers of the State Guard are lo-

cated in Omaha and South Omaha, and only officers vote in the election for commander, this city is considered a strategic point of much importance. Hence the visit of the board of survey is awaited with considerable interest. Several officers of the local companies

approached in regard to the matter declared emphatically they did not believe General Culver or Governor Mickey would sanction any such method as that outlined, but admitted the "board of survey" is a new departure; further, that General Barry evidently has found reason to fear for the success of his candidacy during the last few days, from his prompt dispatch of letters asking for help. The general, who is a democrat and a scarred veteran of civil war, was elected unanimously to the position he now holds, is vice-pres ident of the National Guard Association of the United States, was adjutant general for six years and his friends say, as brigadier general has kept politics out of the organization. The chief importance attached to this office is the fact that the Board of Control, the other members being the adjutant general, two regimental commanders and judge advocate general.


