SHAFROTH DEFENDS WOMEN. Says They Are Not Responsible for the Frauds in Colorado. RIO GRANDE WANTS TO USE WATER BRAKE. War Department Issues a Circular Calling for Proposals for the Purchase of Philippine Temporary Certificates. WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—Former Congressman John L. Shafroth of Colorado, who resigned his seat because of election frauds in Denver, denies that these frauds were committed mainly by women. In an interview today Mr. Shafroth said: "Of the persons implicated very few are women; not more than one in ten at the outside. Frauds were committed in the lowest part of Denver, where not many women live. The incident was not characteristic of the women voting in Colorado and it was preposterous to make it an argument against female suffrage. Everybody knows there are bad women as well as good men, but what would any good man think if it were proposed to take his vote away from him because some bad men had cheated at an election. In Colorado the women vote as generally as the men and fraud is more rare among them. As a rule, their election methods are honorable and the influence of woman suffrage on the state has been distinctly for good."

HOUSE INTERESTED IN NAVY. Bill Provides for an Increased Appropriation of Fourteen Million Dollars. AMOUNT NECESSARY TO MEET CONDITIONS. Mr. Foss Says General is Made with Stroke of the Pen, but that it Takes Years to Make an Admiral. WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—The House upon convening today, passed a bill amending the law so that in a county which lies in two land districts proof may be made at the county seat of such county for either district. Another bill authorizing the construction of pipe lines for oil and gas through the Indian Territory was passed, after having been amended so as to limit the period of grants under the bill to twenty years, on the suggestion of Mr. Williams (Miss.), who said the territory was, or at least he hoped it was, on the eve of acquiring statehood. Other bills were passed as follows: To authorize the shortening of the drawbridge span and the lowering of a bridge near St. Joseph, Mo. Granting to Port Angeles, Wash., for park purposes, certain portions of the government reserve in that city. The house then went into committee of the whole with Mr. Hepburn (Ia.) in the chair, and entered upon consideration of the naval appropriation bill. The minority announced that they wanted five hours' time for general debate and ten hours were agreed upon to be divided equally. Mr. Foss, speaking for the bill, said the aggregate appropriated would afford comfort to the economist and an inspiration to those who believe in the policy of building up the American navy. He also explained the reasons for the increase of \$1,000,000 in this bill over the last, saying among other things that the increase of 2,000 men provided by the bill made an increased appropriation necessary. More men should have been provided, he said, but there was a lack of facilities for training them. United States Banks Fail. Taking up the new warships provided for, Mr. Foss said he believed the naval increase program to be modest and reasonable when what other countries are doing is taken into consideration. Figures were quoted comparing the navies of the powers, showing the United States to rank fifth, in emphasizing the necessity of building up the navy in times of peace and the impossibility of building ships in times of war. Mr. Foss explained: "What would Russia give today if it could call back some of the Russian ships? eternal vigilance is the price of liberty, eternal preparation for war is the price of peace." Mr. Foss called attention to the great difference between the army and navy. The army is largely made up of personnel; the navy generally can be made by the stroke of a pen, but it requires forty years to make an admiral and years of work to build a navy. Referring to the recent troubles in San Domingo, Mr. Foss said the time may come when the United States will say to San Domingo and Haiti that if they cannot preserve order the American navy will do it for them. The Monroe doctrine also must be looked out for. The navy must be relied upon to back up American diplomacy, which, he said, never stood so high as it does today under Secretary Hay. In conclusion he said that when it became necessary to strike a blow the United States should use the power to

ONE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH. Committee at St. Louis Adopts Agreement for Censorship. CONFESION OF FAITH BASIS OF UNION. Action Will Make the Church National in Character, with a Membership Approximated at 1,250,000. ST. LOUIS, Feb. 19.—After conferences extending over the last three days, the committee on church co-operation and union of the Presbyterian churches of the United States and the committee on fraternity and union of the Cumberland Presbyterian church, unanimously adopted an agreement as a basis of the union of the two churches. It is in the shape of a resolution, the adoption of which by both churches and will have to be ratified by both bodies before it becomes operative. Both general assemblies meet May 19, the Presbyterian at Buffalo and the Cumberland at Dallas, Tex. The committee which adopted this report were appointed last year. The action of these committees, if ratified by the general assemblies, will make the Presbyterian church national in character, with a membership approximated at 1,250,000. The report says: We believe that the union of Christian churches of substantially similar faith and policy would be to the glory of God, the good of mankind and the strengthening of Christian testimony at home and abroad. We believe that the manifest providential developments and longings in the two churches since their separation, together with present conditions of agreement and fellowship are such as to justify their reunion. The union shall be effected on the doctrinal basis of the confessional of faith of the Presbyterian church in the United States of America, as revised in 1868, and of its other doctrinal and ecclesiastical standards, and the scriptures of the Old and New Testaments shall be acknowledged as the inspired word of God, the only infallible rule of faith and practice. In adopting this confessional of faith of the Presbyterian church in the United States of America, as revised in 1868, as a basis of union, the churches hereby recognize that the agreement now exists between the systems of doctrine contained in the confessional of faith of the two churches as to warrant this union. Mutual acknowledgment also is made of the teaching and defense of sound evangelical doctrine held in common by these churches and of the divine favor and blessing that attend the common faith and service effectual. It is also recognized that liberty of belief exists by virtue of the provisions of this declaratory statement, which is part of the confessional of faith of the Presbyterian church in the United States of America and which states that the ordination vow of ministers, ruling elders and deacons, as set forth in the confessional, shall be understood as recognizing that the doctrinal delivery also contained in the report of statement of the reformed faith, adopted in 1902 by the general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States of America, is to be held in honor and reverence by the churches. All the ministers and churches included in the two denominations shall be invited to send representatives to a national conference which they may have held in their respective countries up to the consummation of the reunion. The corporate rights now held by the two churches shall be preserved and the committee shall be consolidated and applied for their several objects as defined and permitted by law.
