Indications Favorable to Cash Business and Discouraging for Futures.

BEAR DAY IN CHICAGO FELT HERE May Wheat Opens Strong, Advances,

but Later Breaks and Falls Back Little Over Two

OMAHA, Feb. 23, 1934.

That the Omaha grain market will be a cash market and only secondarily a market in future options is becoming more apparent every day. The crowd which deals in grain for future delivery is not large enough to make a self-sestaining market and for this reason a bear day in Chicago, minimizes transactions on the Omaha floor. Today futures in wheat and oats were dead and practically nothing was done in corn. Chicago was breaking and the Omaha floor was deserted by noon, having no interest for the local speculators. But as the fathditions are entirely satisfactory to them.
