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HARMONY IN CONVENTION

Little Time Required to Transact the Business Before It.

NO SIGN OF CONTEST OVER ANY POINT

Unanimous for Roosevelt, Smith and Macy as Candidates, Wright for Delegate and Hart for National Committeeman.

The republicans of Pottawattamie county in convention assembled yesterday afternoon selected the delegates to the state convention to be held in Des Moines May 18, the convention of the Ninth congressional district to be held at Atlantic May 11 and the convention of the Fifteenth judicial district to be held in Council Bluffs at such date as will be named by the committee.

Resolutions endorsing the tariff principles of William McKinley, endorsing the administration of Governor Cummins and the course of the Iowa delegation in congress, commending the services of Congressman Walter L. Smith and Judge N. W. Macy and instructing the delegates from this county for their renomination, commending the retention of Ernest E. Hart as a member of the national committee, the committee from Iowa and instructing the delegates to the state convention for the selection of Senators Allison and Dolliver, Governor Cummins and J. W. Blythe as delegates-at-large and George S. Wright for delegate from the Ninth district to the national convention were unanimously adopted.

Everything Harmonious. The convention was a veritable love feast, without a single dissenting note to mar its perfect harmony. The gathering was a most enthusiastic one. Every precinct was represented by full delegations, with the result that the south court room in the county court house, where the convention was held, was uncomfortably crowded.

The convention paid a graceful tribute to George S. Wright, chairman of the county central committee and candidate for delegate from the Ninth district to the national convention, by unanimously voting to accord him the privilege of naming the twenty-seven delegates to the state convention. Some delay was caused at the opening of the convention, owing to the inadequacy of the seating facilities for the delegates, but this was finally rectified, and Chairman Wright, on assuming the floor, made the following announcement: "The delegates to the state convention are hereby called to order. The three precincts would be held in different places it had been decided to select three sets of delegates in place of one, as originally stated in the call, named H. V. Batten of Avoca for temporary chairman and W. C. Depeu of Waterloo as temporary secretary.

Mr. Batten was liberally applauded at the close of his remarks, and then the convention got down to the work before it by naming the following committees, after, on motion of J. B. Matlack of Precinct, Mr. Wright on assuming the floor, made the following announcement: "The delegates to the state convention are hereby called to order. 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USE FOR ALL OF THE MONEY

Contracts Will Absorb Board of Control's Unexpended Balance.

GOVERNOR TO SIGN DEPOSIT BILL SOON

Members of Legislature Anxious at Location of the Deaf School.

DES MOINES, March 22.—(Special.)—The Board of Control, under a resolution of the house passed last week, today reported to the legislature on the condition of the various special funds appropriated two years ago. The amount of balance in every fund on all funds under the control of the board amounted March 1 to \$245,964.

The committee is composed of Senators Howell of Polk county, Stocklager of Lincoln, Haselquist of Lucas, Young of Lea and Representatives Frudden of Dubuque, Bealer of Cedar Rapids, Conn of Parkersburg, Weiden of Iowa Falls, Kennedy of Montrose, Nichols of West Liberty, Langan of Clinton and Peet of Springville.

The city engineer, at the request of the Commercial club, has prepared plans showing the elevation of the location of the school buildings and grounds, for the use of the investigating committee.

Representative Frudden, who introduced the resolution for the appointment of the joint committee, when seen last night, said: "Our visit here is simply to investigate the site and surroundings of the institution. There is considerable discrepancy between the statements of the Board of Control and those who favor the retention of the school at its present location." Beyond this Mr. Frudden declined to discuss the matter.
