

LOUBET VISITS ROME

President of French Republic Met at the Station by Imposing Corriage.

WELCOMED BY KING VICTOR EMMANUEL

Italian Monarch Attended by Court Dignitaries and High Officers of State.

KING AND THE PRESIDENT EMBRACE

Oration Follows the Arrival of the President at the Palace.

ROME IS MAGNIFICENTLY ILLUMINATED

One of the Features of the Reception is a Torchlight Procession in Which 15,000 Persons Take Part.

ROME, April 24—President Loubet, accompanied by Foreign Minister Delcasse and a distinguished party of French officials, arrived in Rome today to repay the visit of King Victor Emmanuel to Paris in October last.

At the president stepped from the train the prince of Colonna, mayor of Rome, formally welcomed him on behalf of the city. The king and the president embraced each other while the 'Marseillaise' was played by several bands.

The drive to the apartment was then taken up and had the appearance of a triumphal march, culminating in an ovation at the palace, where President Loubet, King Victor Emmanuel and queen and the princes were obliged to appear on the balcony three times.

At the residence of the American ambassador to Germany, and Andrew D. White, the former ambassador to Germany, witnessed the passage of the procession from the garden of the American church.

At Rome is magnificently illuminated tonight. A torchlight procession in which 15,000 persons participated produced a fantastic effect.

From an official source it is learned that Italy desired to prove that while loyal to the triple alliance, it is quite free to entertain friendly relations with other powers.

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ARBITRATION FOR A TOPIC

Annual International Conference to Be Held at Lake Mohonk.

EXPECT LARGEST CONGRESS EVER HELD

LAKE MOHONK, N. Y., April 24.—Judge George Gray will preside over the tenth annual conference on international arbitration, which will be held from June 1 to June 15.

Among the speakers announced are Commissioners MacFarland of the District of Columbia, whose topic will be the proposed arbitration with England; Charles M. Pepper, special commissioner of the Pan-American railroad, who spoke of the relation of this enterprise to the cause of peace.

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FIERCE STORM IN MISSOURI
