FEW SUPERINTENDENTS OUT

Attendance at Convention a Disappaintment to Those Interested.

PROGRAM IS NECESSARILY CUT SHORT

Some Topics of Interest to Schools Discussed by Those in Attendance-Endorse Teaching of Agriculture.

Owing to the small attendance the spring meeting of the county school superintendents of Southwestern Iowa was brought to a close yesterday noon. D. E. Brainard of Harrison county was the only new arrival yesterday morning. The program as outlined by State Superintendent Riggs was but partially carried out, several of he subjects suggested not being discussed at

"How May the Institutes be Made of Greater Value to the Teachers?" and "Should Examination for Teachers' Certificates Immediately Follow the Institute? being kindred subjects were discussed to gether, the opinion of the superintendents present being that the institutes should attempt less academic work and be conducted more on the lecture plan and that examinations should be divorced from the institute. Some of the superintendents present stated that they had inaugurated a plan of holding the examinations in advance of the institute and had found it most successful.

The discussion on the subject "Should Agriculture be Taught in the District Schools?" showed that the meeting favored such instruction in the rural schools. That is, it favored the teaching of the elements of agriculture through what is generally known as "nature study.

The question of "How May School Sites be Beautified and School Property Improved?" was disposed of by a statement from State Superintendent Riggs to the effect that the state department intended to take this matter up and suggest a plan. Superintendent McManus of this city addressed the meeting on "The Iowa State Teachers' Reading Circle." He urged that every teacher become a member of the circle as by so doing they could best prepare for the professional examination in didactics. The reading and study of the Bible, he suggested, was necessary to a proper interpretation of literature, saying in part:

in part:

Since a knowledge of the Bible, and particularly the Old Testament, is necessary to a proper interpretation of literature, the book will be well received by teachers who view it largely from the standpoint of its literary value; but it will fill a still larger place as a work of ethical instruction for the young; from this point of view, the Old Testament stories are without parallel in the world's literature. In view of the great emphasis now put upon the importance of ethical instruction, the book should be read by all who are interested in the material which quickens the conscience and strengthens the emotions of all peoples.

GIVES THE CONSTABLE A VERDIC County Will Appeal Case to Test the Right to Feen.

Constable Alberti of Justice Ouren's court secured in the district court yesterday a Judgment against Pottawattamie county to the Board of Supervisors but disallowed by it on recommendation of the county attorney's office. The demurrer filed by the county was overruled and as the county elected to stand upon the demurrer judg ment was entered for Alberti. The amount at stake was small, but the question involved County Attorney Killpack considers of sufficient importance to take the case on appeal to the supreme court, which will be done.

"Is a constable entitled to charge a fee every time he produces a prisoner from the county jail in a justice court?" is the question at issue. Every time that Con stable Alberti served an "order to pro duce" a prisoner on the county failor he taxed up a fee of 30 cents and 10 cents mileage. The constable took the position that an "order to produce!" was to all intents and purposes an order "to release. For instance, a person whose hearing was in progress in a justice court and who had been sent to the county jail waiting its determination might be brought before the court several times before the hearing would be completed and each time that he was taken back to the jail and again brought to the court the constable taxed up the fee of 30 cents and 10 cents mileage. In one case alone the officer had taxed up the fee and milage for no less than nineteen orders "to produce." making a total of \$7.60, which the officer demanded for taking the prisoner to and from the county

County Attorney Killpack takes the pe sition that the fee taxed by the constable for the service of an order to produce is not a fee contemplated by statute, inas much as the constable is allowed a per diem while in attendance on court. Mr. Killpack is of the opinion that the

question is of sufficient importance to se cure a ruling on it from the supreme court and accordingly secured an order from Judge Wheeler to appeal the case.
