The measure contemplates excluding al automobiles from the thoroughfare, as it provides that all vehicles propelled by other lower than horses shall be prohibited, the object of the ordinance as set forth being to provide a suitable place for drivto be used for carriages and light ve-

bicles only. Reckless and careless driving is also pro hibited by the ordinance and a penalty named for such breaches of the measure Any intoxicated or bolsterous person found driving on the proposed boulevard will also be subject to a fine. Another provision is that all sidewalk crossings shall be formed of gravel or cinders and shall be on a level with the street within the limits specified.
