Jones Predicts Sensation in Wheat, Which Depends on Weather-

GIVES RESULT OF HIS TOUR OF THE WEST

Market Practically Bare and Few Samples Displayed Lack Interest for Brokers-Cash Has the Upper Hand.

OMAHA, May 5, 1974.

H. V. Jones of the Commercial West, a recognized crop statistician, who has been making a tour of the wheat beit says:

"I want you to be prepared for a sensation in winter wheat. I mean by this the crop is in such a condition that by June 10 it can go to pieces if the weather before that date is not all right. The sensation will come from Ohlo, indiana and Michigan, anyway. The figures of the state reports are not low enough, for the farmers give in 40 per cent, when the figures should be 10 or 20 per cent. Eight states east of the Rockies may give 60,08,000 bushels yield less than last year. Missouri is alone showing a slightly better crop than for 1963. Maryland and Virginia look well and are most normal in the country, except parts of Kansas. Kentucky is spotted, At best the country will raise 20,00,000 bushels less than last year and perhaps 80,000,000 if the weather is unfavorable. There is very little growth to wheat for the season. September wheat may break 4 or 5 cents if we have warmer weather, but the country may realize early the moderate prospects, and September wheat may not go under so cents.
