It is further provided that if a greater dorsement by the state convention will rate of interest than is hereinbefore allowed shall be contracted for or received, the contract shall not be void, but the loaner can, if proof is shown of lilegal interest, recover only the principal, the loss of interest being the penalty for exacting usury.

Under the rulings of courts heretofore it has been possible for the men to exact usury and yet avoid the penatty. For instance, a man may apply for \$1,000 for five years, but takes his 10 per cent in terest out in advance. In effect he loans the man \$500 actual cash and holds a contract upon which he may collect \$1,009 at the end of five years. Actually he collects interest at the rate of 20 per cent a year. Such toans have not been unusual If the supreme court opinion is what I seems to be the payment of interest thereon can be voided.
